

Crochet Hanging Flower Wall Decor

♥ Step-by-Step Tutorial ♥



MATERIALS

- Worsted Weight Yarn
 - Cream (main circle and border)
 - Pink (bow and roses)
 - White (daisy petals)
 - Yellow (daisy center)
 - Green (leaves and stems)
 - Terracotta / Light Brown (flower pots)
- 4.0 mm (G) Crochet Hook
- Yarn Needle
- Scissors
- Stuffing (optional, for pots and bow)
- 3-4 mm Braided Cord or Crochet Cord (for hanging)

ABBREVIATIONS (US TERMS)

ch – chain
sl st – slip stitch
sc – single crochet
hdc – half double crochet
dc – double crochet
tr – treble crochet
inc – increase (2 sc in next st)
dec – decrease (sc2tog)
BLO – back loop only

Hanging Cord
approx. 12"
(30 cm)



FINISHED SIZE

Width: ~9" (23 cm)
Height (without cord):
~9" (23 cm)

1. BASE CIRCLE (Make 1)

1. Ch 4, join with sl st to form a ring.
2. Rnd 1: Ch 1, 8 sc in ring, sl st to join. (8)
3. Rnd 2: Ch 1, inc in each st around, sl st. (16)
4. Rnd 3: Ch 1, (sc, inc) around, sl st. (24)
5. Rnd 4: Ch 1, (2 sc, inc) around, sl st. (32)
6. Continue in this pattern, increasing 8 sts each round until circle is approx. 8½-9" (22-23 cm) in diameter.
7. Sl st and FO, weave in ends.



2. BOW (Make 1)

1. Ch 21.
2. Row 1: Hdc in 3rd ch from hook and across. Ch 2, turn. (19)
3. Row 2-10: Hdc across, ch 2, turn.
4. FO, leaving a long tail for wrapping.
5. Fold the rectangle in half.
6. Wrap the center with yarn several times. Secure at back.
7. Using pink yarn, make a small strip: Ch 6, hdc across. Make another strip the same way.
8. Sew or glue the strips to the back as bow tails.



3. DAISY (Make 1)

Center (Yellow)

1. Ch 2, 6 sc in 2nd ch from hook. (6)
2. Inc around. (12)
3. Sc in each st around. FO, leave long tail.

Petals (White)

1. Join white yarn in any st.
2. (Ch 5, sl st in same st) repeat 12 times.
3. Fasten off.

Leaves & Stem (Green)

1. Make a chain for stem: Ch 10.
2. Leaves (make 2): Ch 7, sc in 2nd ch from hook, hdc, dc, hdc, sc, sl st.
3. Sew leaves to each side of the stem.



4. ROSES (Make 4-6)

1. Ch 31.
2. Sc in 2nd ch from hook and across. (30)
3. Roll the strip tightly to form a rose.
4. Sew the base to hold shape.
5. Make stems: Ch 8.
6. (Optional) Make small leaves: Ch 6, sc, hdc, dc, hdc, sc, sl st. Sew to stem.



5. FLOWER POTS (Make 3)

1. With brown yarn. Ch 2, 6 sc in 2nd ch from hook. (6)
3. Rnd 2: Inc around. (12)
3. Rnd 3: (Sc, inc) around. (18)
4. Rnds 4-6: Sc in each st around.
5. Rnd 7: (Sc, dec) around. (12)
6. Rnd 8: Sc around.
7. FO, weave in ends. (Optional: Add stuffing or firm shape.)



6. ASSEMBLY

1. Arrange the pots on the base (left rose pot, centee daisy pot, right rose pot).
2. Sew or glue each pot securely to the base.
3. Insert stems into the pots.
4. Add small white daisies and leaves around the roses as shown.
5. Attach the bow to the top of the circle.



7. HANGING CORD

Option 1: Crochet Cord

1. Ch 3.
2. Make a long chain (approx. 24" / 60 cm).
3. Sl st in same direction to form a braided cord.

Option 2: Use braided rope or pre-made cord.

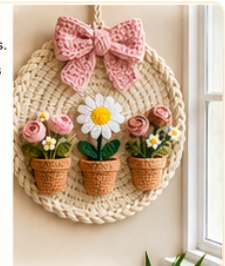
4. Attach the cord at the top center behind the bow. Tie a knot securely.



8. FINISHING

- ✓ Weave in all ends.
- ✓ Adjust all flowers and leaves.
- ✓ Block gently if needed.

Your crochet flower wall hanging is ready!



METHODS & STITCHES (US TERMS)

Chain (ch)

Yarn over, pull through loop.



Slip Stitch (sl st)

Insert hook, yarn over, pull through both loops.



Single Crochet (sc)

Insert hook, yarn over, pull up loop, yarn over, pull through 2 loops.



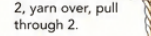
Half Double Crochet (hdc)

Yarn over, insert hook, yarn over, pull up loop, yarn over, pull through all 3 loops.



Double Crochet (dc)

Yarn over, insert hook, yarn over, pull up loop, yarn over, pull through 2, yarn over, pull through 2.



Increase (inc)

Work 2 sc in the same stitch.



Decrease (dec)

Single crochet 2 stitches together.



TIPS

- ♥ Use stiff cotton yarn for best shape.
- ♥ Block your base circle to flatten.
- ♥ Hot glue can help secure small parts.
- ♥ Customize with more flowers or colors!

- 3.5 mm (E) crochet hook (for main parts)
- 2.5 mm (C) crochet hook (for small details)
- Tapestry needle
- Scissors
- Stitch marker
- Hot glue (optional for extra hold)

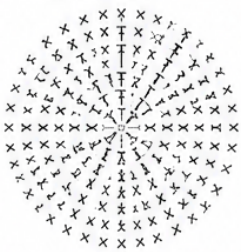

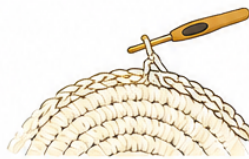
1. BASE (MAKE 1)



- R1: Magic ring, 6 sc [6]
 R2: inc in each st [12]
 R3: (sc, inc) x6 [18]
 R4: (2 sc, inc) x6 [24]
 R5: (3 sc, inc) x6 [30]
 R6: (4 sc, inc) x6 [36]
 R7: (5 sc, inc) x6 [42]
 R8: (6 sc, inc) x6 [48]
 R9: (7 sc, inc) x6 [54]
 R10: (8 sc, inc) x6 [60]
 R11–R14: sc in each st [60]
 Do not fasten off.

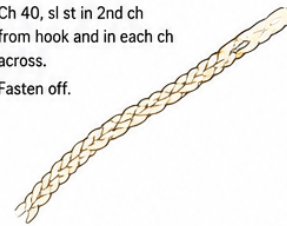
2. BRAIDED EDGE

Working in front loops only, do 1 round of sl st.
 Fasten off.



3. HANGING CORD

Ch 40, sl st in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across.
 Fasten off.

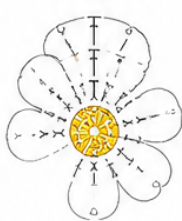


4. BOW (MAKE 1)



Center Wrap:
 Ch 12, wrap around bow center and sew.

5. DAISY (MAKE 1)



- Center (Yellow):
 R1: Magic ring, 6 sc [6]
 R2: inc in each st [12]
 R3: (sc, inc) x6 [18]
 Petals (White):
 Ch 6, sl st in 2nd ch from hook, hdc, dc, hdc, sl st in next st (base). Repeat around 18 times.

6. ROSE (MAKE 2–4)

Ch 30.
 Starting in 2nd ch from hook:
 sc, hdc, dc, hdc, sc...
 (work back along the chain).
 Roll up and sew the base.



7. SMALL FLOWER (MAKE 2–4)

Center (Yellow):

Magic ring, 6 sc.

Petals (White):
 Ch 2, sl st in same st, repeat 5 times.



8. LEAVES (MAKE AS NEEDED)

Ch 10.
 Row 1: sc, hdc, 3 dc, hdc, sc, sl st, sl st.
 Row 2: ch 1, sc across, sl st.
 Fasten off.



9. FLOWER POT (MAKE 3)

- R1: Magic ring, 6 sc [6]
 R2: inc in each st [12]
 R3: (sc, inc) x6 [18]
 R4: (2 sc, inc) x6 [24]
 R5–R8: sc in each st [24]
 R9 (Rim): BLO sc in each st [24]
 Fasten off.



10. ASSEMBLY

- Sew or glue the bow at the top.
- Sew the hanging cord behind the bow.
- Arrange and sew the pots at the bottom.
- Add flowers, leaves, and small flowers into each pot.
- Attach the daisy in the center.
- Weave in all ends.

Use stitch markers to keep your rounds even and neat. Block your piece gently for a beautiful finish!

Crochet Hanging Flower Wall Decor – Complete Step-by-Step Tutorial

This Crochet Hanging Flower Wall Decor combines a sturdy round crochet base, a decorative pink bow, a large daisy, several roses, green leaves, flowerpots, and a hanging cord. The finished piece measures approximately 9 inches wide by 9 inches high (23 × 23 cm), not including the hanging cord.

This project uses US crochet terminology. Read through the complete tutorial before beginning, especially the assembly section, so you can plan the placement of every flower and pot.

Materials and Supplies

You will need:

- Worsted weight yarn
- Cream yarn for the main circle and border
- Pink yarn for the bow and roses
- White yarn for the daisy petals
- Yellow yarn for the daisy center
- Green yarn for leaves and stems
- Terracotta or light-brown yarn for the flowerpots
- 4.0 mm US G crochet hook
- Yarn needle
- Scissors
- Stitch marker
- Measuring tape
- Small amount of stuffing, optional
- Hot glue gun or fabric glue, optional
- 3–4 mm braided cord or crochet cord for hanging

- **Blocking mat and pins, optional**

A firm cotton or cotton-blend yarn is recommended because it helps the circle, pots, leaves, and flowers maintain their shape.

US Crochet Abbreviations

- **ch – chain**
- **sl st – slip stitch**
- **st – stitch**
- **sts – stitches**
- **sc – single crochet**

The number shown inside parentheses at the end of a round or row indicates the total number of stitches.

Important Crochet Methods

To make a chain, create a slip knot, insert the hook into the loop, yarn over, and pull the yarn through the loop. Repeat until you have the required number of chains.

To make a slip stitch, insert the hook into the indicated stitch, yarn over, and pull the yarn through the stitch and directly through the loop on the hook.

To make a single crochet, insert the hook into the stitch, yarn over, and pull up a loop. Yarn over again and pull through both loops on the hook.

To make a half double crochet, yarn over, insert the hook into the stitch, yarn over, and pull up a loop. Yarn over and pull through all three loops on the hook.

To make a double crochet, yarn over and insert the hook into the stitch. Yarn over and pull up a loop. Yarn over and pull through two loops, then yarn over and pull through the remaining two loops.

To make a treble crochet, yarn over twice before inserting the hook. Insert the hook, yarn over, and pull up a loop. Yarn over and pull through two loops three times.

An increase is made by working two stitches into the same stitch. A decrease is made by joining two stitches together so they become one stitch.

Step 1: Crochet the Base Circle

Use the cream yarn and the 4.0 mm crochet hook.

The circle forms the foundation of the wall hanging. Keep your tension firm and consistent so the finished base remains flat.

Round 1: Chain 4. Join with a slip stitch in the first chain to form a ring.

Chain 1. Work 8 single crochets into the center of the ring. Join with a slip stitch in the first single crochet. You should have 8 stitches.

Round 2: Chain 1. Work 2 single crochets in each stitch around. Join with a slip stitch. You should have 16 stitches.

Round 3: Chain 1. Work 1 single crochet in the first stitch and 2 single crochets in the next stitch. Repeat this sequence around. Join with a slip stitch. You should have 24 stitches.

Round 4: Chain 1. Work 1 single crochet in each of the next 2 stitches, then work 2 single crochets in the next stitch. Repeat around. Join with a slip stitch. You should have 32 stitches.

Continue increasing by 8 stitches in every round.

For the next rounds, add one additional single crochet between each increase:

- **Next round: 3 single crochets, increase**
- **Following round: 4 single crochets, increase**
- **Following round: 5 single crochets, increase**

Continue in this pattern until the circle measures approximately 8½–9 inches or 22–23 cm across.

Check the circle frequently while working. Lay it on a flat surface every few rounds.

When the circle reaches the required size, join with a slip stitch and fasten off. Weave in the yarn ends securely.

If the circle begins to curl upward, your tension may be too tight or you may need additional increases. If the circle becomes wavy, you may have too many increases. Gentle blocking can correct small irregularities.

Step 2: Add the Decorative Border

The original design features a raised, braided-looking cream border around the base.

Join the cream yarn near the outer edge of the finished circle.

You may create a simple firm border by working one round of single crochet evenly around the circle. Join with a slip stitch.

For a thicker decorative edge, work another round of single crochet or reverse single crochet. Keep the stitches even and avoid adding unnecessary increases.

Another option is to crochet a long cream chain or narrow cord and sew it around the outside of the circle. This produces the prominent braided appearance shown in the project.

Pin the cord around the circumference before sewing. Use matching cream yarn and small, hidden stitches to secure it in place.

Make sure the border lies flat and does not pull the circle inward.

Step 3: Crochet the Pink Bow

Use pink yarn.

The bow is made from a rectangular strip that is folded and wrapped in the center.

Foundation: Chain 21.

Row 1: Work 1 half double crochet in the third chain from the hook. Work 1 half double crochet in each remaining chain across. You should have 19 half double crochets.

Chain 2 and turn.

Rows 2–10: Work 1 half double crochet in each stitch across. Chain 2 and turn after each row.

After completing Row 10, fasten off and leave a long yarn tail for wrapping and sewing.

Fold the rectangle in half so the two short edges meet. Sew the short edges together to create a loop.

Flatten the loop with the seam positioned at the center back. Pinch the middle firmly to form two bow loops.

Wrap the long yarn tail around the center several times. Pull each wrap tightly enough to define the bow without folding the loops too sharply.

Secure the yarn at the back with several knots.

Step 4: Make the Bow Tails

Use the same pink yarn.

Tail 1: Chain 6.

Beginning in the third chain from the hook, work 1 half double crochet in each chain across. Fasten off.

Repeat to make the second tail.

Arrange the two tails behind the bow so they point diagonally downward. Sew or glue them securely to the back of the bow.

The lower ends may be left straight or shaped into soft points. Weave in all visible yarn ends.

Set the completed bow aside until the final assembly.

Step 5: Crochet the Daisy Center 🌻

Use yellow yarn.

Round 1: Chain 2. Work 6 single crochets in the second chain from the hook. Do not join unless you prefer working in joined rounds.

Round 2: Work 2 single crochets in each stitch around. You should have 12 stitches.

Round 3: Work 1 single crochet in each stitch around.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing.

The center should be a small, slightly raised yellow circle. A tiny amount of stuffing can be placed behind it during assembly for a more dimensional appearance.

Step 6: Crochet the White Daisy Petals

Join white yarn in any stitch of the yellow center.

To make the first petal:

Chain 5.

Beginning in the second chain from the hook, work:

- **1 slip stitch**
- **1 single crochet**
- **1 half double crochet**
- **1 single crochet**

Slip stitch into the next stitch of the yellow center.

Repeat this petal sequence around until you have 12 white petals.

Fasten off and weave in the white yarn ends.

Use your fingers to gently shape and separate the petals. The petals should form an even circle around the yellow center.

Step 7: Crochet the Daisy Stem

Use green yarn.

Chain approximately 10, or make a chain long enough for the daisy to extend from the center flowerpot to the desired position on the wall hanging.

Beginning in the second chain from the hook, slip stitch in each chain across.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for attaching the stem.

This narrow slip-stitch cord creates a firm stem that will hold its shape when sewn to the base.

Step 8: Crochet the Daisy Leaves

Make two leaves with green yarn.

For each leaf: Chain 7.

Beginning in the second chain from the hook, work the following stitches along one side of the chain:

- 1 half double crochet
- 1 double crochet
- 1 half double crochet
- 1 single crochet
- 1 slip stitch

Work around the end of the chain if needed, then fasten off with a long sewing tail.

Shape each leaf with your fingers so it has a pointed end.

Sew one leaf to each side of the daisy stem. Position them slightly above the flowerpot so they remain visible in the finished arrangement.

Step 9: Crochet the Roses



Make approximately 4–6 roses, depending on how full you want the flower arrangement to appear.

Use pink yarn for some roses and a darker pink, dusty rose, or terracotta-pink yarn for others.

Foundation: Chain 31.

Beginning in the second chain from the hook, work 1 single crochet in each chain across. You should have 30 single crochets.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing.

The strip may naturally begin to curve. Starting at one end, roll it tightly to form the center of the rose.

Continue rolling the strip around the center. Allow the outer layers to become slightly looser so the flower opens naturally.

Thread the long yarn tail onto a yarn needle. Sew back and forth across the underside of the rolled strip, catching every layer.

Pull the stitches firmly and knot securely. Make sure the rose cannot unroll.

Repeat the process until you have enough roses for the left and right pots.

Step 10: Crochet the Rose Stems

Use green yarn.

For each rose stem, chain approximately 8.

Beginning in the second chain from the hook, slip stitch in each chain across.

Fasten off, leaving yarn tails for assembly.

Make the stems in slightly different lengths. This helps the flowers sit at varied heights and creates a more natural bouquet.

Step 11: Crochet the Small Rose Leaves

Use green yarn.

For each small leaf:

Chain 6.

Beginning in the second chain from the hook, work:

- **1 single crochet**
- **1 half double crochet**
- **1 double crochet**
- **1 half double crochet**
- **1 single crochet**

Fasten off, leaving a sewing tail.

Make several small leaves and sew them beside the rose stems. You may use two leaves for each main rose stem or arrange them wherever the bouquet needs more greenery.

Step 12: Crochet the Small White Accent Flowers

The original wall hanging includes tiny white-and-yellow flowers around the roses.

For the yellow center, chain 2 and work 5 or 6 single crochets into the second chain from the hook. Join with a slip stitch.

Change to white yarn.

For each small petal, chain 2, work a slip stitch into the next center stitch, and repeat around.

Fasten off and weave in the ends.

Make several small flowers and distribute them between the larger roses. These flowers help fill empty spaces and make the arrangement look balanced.

Step 13: Crochet the Flowerpots 🌿

Make three flowerpots with terracotta or light-brown yarn.

The pots are crocheted from the bottom upward in joined or continuous rounds.

Round 1: Chain 2. Work 6 single crochets in the second chain from the hook. You should have 6 stitches.

Round 2: Work 2 single crochets in each stitch around. You should have 12 stitches.

Round 3: Work 1 single crochet in the first stitch and 2 single crochets in the next stitch. Repeat around. You should have 18 stitches.

Rounds 4–6: Work 1 single crochet in each stitch around. Maintain 18 stitches.

Round 7: Work a single crochet decrease, then work 1 single crochet in the next stitch. Repeat around. You should have approximately 12 stitches.

Round 8: Work 1 single crochet in each stitch around.

Fasten off and weave in the ends.

The pot should have a narrow bottom, slightly wider body, and open top.

For a more defined rim, join yarn at the opening and work one additional round of single crochet. You can also work this round in the back loops only to create a subtle ridge.

The original design shows a textured horizontal band near the top. This can be recreated with surface slip stitches or by adding a separate chain around the pot.

Step 14: Shape and Stuff the Flowerpots

Lightly stuff each pot if you want a rounded, three-dimensional shape.

Do not overstuff. Too much stuffing can make the pots heavy and difficult to attach.

You may place a small piece of brown felt or a crocheted brown circle inside the opening to imitate soil. This is optional but helps hide the lower ends of the stems.

Arrange the stems inside each pot before attaching the pot to the base. Sew the stems to the inside back edge of the pot so they remain upright.

Step 15: Plan the Complete Arrangement

Place the finished base circle on a flat surface.

Before sewing or gluing anything, arrange all pieces temporarily.

Place the three flowerpots across the lower portion of the circle:

- Rose pot on the left
- Daisy pot in the center
- Rose pot on the right

The center pot can be placed slightly lower or farther forward than the side pots.

Position the large daisy above the center pot. Its top should remain below the bow so both details are clearly visible.

Place two or three roses above the left pot and two or three roses above the right pot.

Add small white flowers and green leaves around the roses. Keep the arrangement balanced without making both sides perfectly identical.

Place the pink bow at the top center of the circle.

Take a photo of the arrangement before moving the pieces. This gives you a visual guide during sewing.

Step 16: Attach the Flowerpots

Begin with the center pot.

Thread a yarn needle with matching terracotta yarn. Sew the pot to the cream base around the sides and bottom edge.

Leave the top opening slightly raised so the stems appear to emerge naturally from inside the pot.

Attach the left and right pots in the same way.

Check that all three pots are level and evenly spaced before making the final knots.

For a quicker method, apply small amounts of hot glue to the backs of the pots. However, sewing creates a more durable and washable finish.

Step 17: Attach the Stems, Flowers, and Leaves

Sew the main daisy stem vertically above the center pot. Keep your stitches small and place them through the center of the green cord.

Attach the daisy at the top of the stem. Sew around the back of the yellow center, avoiding the white petals.

Sew the two large green leaves on opposite sides of the daisy stem.

Attach the rose stems above the side pots. Use different heights and angles to prevent the arrangement from looking stiff.

Sew each rose securely through its underside. Add green leaves around the stems and roses.

Position the small white flowers in the remaining spaces. Sew them through the center so their petals remain free and dimensional.

After attaching each piece, lift the base vertically to make sure nothing droops or pulls away.

Step 18: Attach the Pink Bow

Place the bow at the top center of the circle.

Its lower tails may slightly overlap the cream circle border. Keep the main bow loops completely visible.

Thread a yarn needle with pink yarn. Sew through the back center of the bow and into the base several times.

Add a few hidden stitches beneath each bow loop and tail for extra support.

Do not flatten the bow while sewing. Maintain its soft, dimensional shape.

Step 19: Make the Hanging Cord

There are two options for the hanging cord.

Option 1: Crochet Cord

Using cream yarn, chain 3.

Work a long crochet cord or chain approximately 24 inches or 60 cm long.

A simple chain can be used, but a braided crochet cord will be stronger.

One easy method is to work slip stitches back along a long chain. Another method is to create several yarn strands, twist them together, and allow them to fold into a cord.

Option 2: Premade Braided Cord

Cut a piece of 3–4 mm braided cord approximately 24 inches or 60 cm long.

Fold the cord in half to create a loop.

The loop should extend approximately 12 inches or 30 cm above the top of the wall hanging.

Step 20: Attach the Hanging Cord

Place both ends of the cord at the top center of the circle, directly behind the bow.

Sew the ends firmly to the back of the crochet base with strong cream yarn.

Pass the needle through the cord and the base multiple times. Tie several secure knots.

Add a small amount of fabric glue or hot glue over the hidden attachment point if extra strength is needed.

Test the cord by gently lifting the wall hanging. Make sure the base hangs straight and the bow remains centered.

Step 21: Weave In the Ends and Finish the Back

Turn the project over and inspect the back.

Weave in every loose yarn end with a yarn needle. Pass each end through several nearby stitches, reverse direction, and pass it through again before trimming.

Secure any loose flower, leaf, pot, or bow.

For a cleaner back, you may cover the rear surface with a circle of felt or fabric. Cut the backing slightly smaller than the crochet circle and hand-sew it around the edge.

Do not cover the hanging-cord attachment until you have tested its strength.

Step 22: Block and Shape the Wall Hanging

Place the completed wall hanging on a blocking mat or thick towel.

Gently shape the base into a round circle.

Straighten the border, arrange the flower petals, and shape the leaves and bow loops.

Lightly mist the cream base with water if the yarn allows wet blocking. Avoid soaking the flowers or heavily stuffed pots.

Pin the outer edge and allow the piece to dry completely.

Use care with acrylic yarn because high heat can permanently change the fibers. Do not place a hot iron directly on the crochet.

Step 23: Final Inspection

Before displaying the project, check the following:

- The base circle lies flat
- The border is even
- The three pots are securely attached

- The daisy is centered
- The roses are balanced on both sides
- The leaves and small flowers fill the arrangement naturally
- The bow is centered and firmly attached
- The hanging cord supports the complete piece
- All yarn ends are hidden
- No glue is visible from the front

Adjust the flowers and leaves with your fingers until the arrangement looks full and symmetrical.

Care Instructions

Spot clean the wall hanging by hand using cool water and a small amount of mild soap.

Do not machine wash, especially if the design contains glue, stuffing, or an internal backing.

Do not wring or twist the piece.

Press it gently between clean towels to remove excess moisture.

Reshape the circle, flowers, leaves, pots, and bow while damp.

Lay the wall hanging flat to dry completely.

Helpful Tips for the Best Result

Use firm cotton yarn for better stitch definition and structure.

Keep the base-circle increases evenly spaced. This prevents visible corners and helps the circle remain round.

Make the roses in slightly different shades of pink for a more natural floral arrangement.

Use a smaller hook if your pots or flowers feel too loose.

Block the base before attaching the decorations when possible.

Sew all large pieces rather than relying entirely on glue. Glue is most useful for tiny flowers, small leaves, or hidden reinforcement.

Arrange every component before permanent attachment. Small changes in spacing can greatly improve the final composition.
