

CROCHET WALL POCKET ORGANIZER

Step-by-Step Tutorial



ABOUT THIS PROJECT

This practical and beautiful wall organizer has 9 deep pockets to hold your crochet hooks, scissors, yarn, and other craft supplies. It's perfect for keeping your space tidy and adding a handmade touch to your craft corner!

MATERIALS

- Worsted Weight (4) Cotton Yarn in 5 colors
- 5.0 mm (H) crochet hook
- Yarn needle
- Scissors
- Wooden dowel or stick (30–35 cm / 12–14 in)
- Optional: 2 wall hooks or nails

FINISHED SIZE

Approx. 50 cm (19.7 in) wide
x 70 cm (27.5 in) tall

BASIC STITCHES (US TERMS)

Chain (ch)

Yarn over, pull through the loop.



Single Crochet (sc)

Insert hook, yarn over, pull up a loop, yarn over, pull through both loops.



Half Double Crochet (hdc)

Yarn over, insert hook, yarn over, pull up a loop, yarn over, pull through all 3 loops.



Double Crochet (dc)

Yarn over, insert hook, yarn over, pull up a loop, yarn over, pull through 2 loops, yarn over, pull through 2 loops.



KEY METHODS

- Ch = Chain
- Sc = Single Crochet
- Hdc = Half Double Crochet
- Dc = Double Crochet
- Sl st = Slip Stitch

STEP-BY-STEP TUTORIAL

1 MAKE THE POCKETS (Make 9)

Ch 21.

Row 1: Sc in 2nd ch from hook and across. (20 sc)

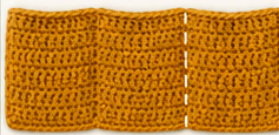
Rows 2–13: Ch 1, turn, sc in each st across. (20 sc)

Fasten off. Make 9 pockets in desired colors.



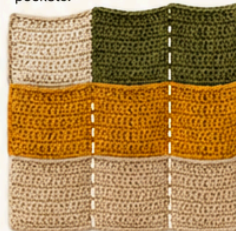
2 JOIN POCKETS INTO ROWS

Place 3 pockets side by side. Using the yarn needle and whip stitch, sew the sides together. Repeat for the remaining rows.



3 JOIN THE ROWS

Sew the rows together using the yarn needle at the seams between pockets.



4 CROCHET THE BACKING PANEL

Ch 81.

Row 1: Sc in 2nd ch from hook and across. (80 sc)

Rows 2–56: Ch 1, turn, sc in each st across. (80 sc)

Fasten off.



Adjust the width (multiple of 3 pockets) and height as needed.

5 ATTACH POCKETS TO BACKING

Position the pocket panel on the lower part of the backing and sew along the top edge of each row to secure.



6 CREATE HANGING LOOPS

Top Left Loop:

Ch 8, sl st into the top-left corner, ch 8 again, sl st back into the same corner.

Repeat on the top-right corner.



7 ADD DOWEL POCKET (OPTIONAL)

Ch 85.

Row 1: Sc in 2nd ch from hook and across. (84 sc)

Rows 2–56: Ch 1, turn, sc in each st across. (84 sc)

Sl st into the top edge of the backing, creating a pocket for the dowel.

Insert the dowel.



COLOR SUGGESTIONS



FINISHING

✓ Weave in all ends neatly with a yarn needle.

✓ Insert a wooden dowel through the top pocket for extra stability.

✓ Hang your organizer on the wall using hooks or nails.



CARE INSTRUCTIONS



Hand wash cold



Do not bleach



Lay flat to dry



Iron low if needed

TIPS

- Use cotton yarn for durability and stitch definition.
- Customize the size by adjusting the number of stitches and rows.
- Great for organizing crochet supplies, office tools, or small items.

CROCHET HANGING POCKET ORGANIZER

PATTERN & STITCH GUIDE



MATERIALS

- Worsted weight cotton yarn (4 colors) about 200–250 g per color
- Crochet hook 5.0 mm (H)
- Tapestry needle
- Scissors
- Wooden dowel or stick (optional)
- Wall hooks or nails

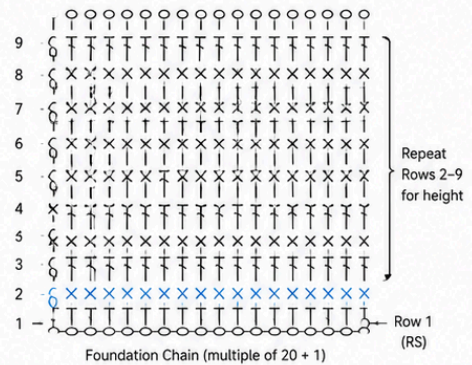
ASSEMBLY

1. Arrange 12 pockets on the back panel (4 rows of 3 pockets).
2. Sew the sides and bottom of each pocket to the back panel using whip stitch.
3. Make sure the tops remain open.
4. Hang using the loops or attach to a wooden dowel for extra support.

STITCH GUIDE (US TERMS)

- Chain (ch)
- Slip Stitch (sl st)
- × Single Crochet (sc)
- ┐ Half Double Crochet (hdc)
- ┐ Double Crochet (dc)
- ┐ Treble Crochet (tr)
- Back Loop Only (BLO)

BASIC STITCH DIAGRAM (POCKET)



POCKET PATTERN (MAKE 12)

Each pocket is worked in rows.

Foundation: Ch 21

Row 1 (RS): Sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across. (20 sc)

Row 2: Ch 1, turn. Sc in BLO across. (20 sc)

Row 3: Ch 1, turn. Sc across. (20 sc)

Row 4: Ch 1, turn. Hdc across. (20 hdc)

Row 5: Ch 1, turn. Dc across. (20 dc)

Row 6: Ch 1, turn. Hdc across. (20 hdc)

Row 7: Ch 1, turn. Sc across. (20 sc)

Row 8: Ch 1, turn. Sc in BLO across. (20 sc)

Row 9: Ch 1, turn. Sc across. (20 sc)

Repeat Rows 2–9 for desired height. Fasten off and weave in ends.

(Finished size per pocket approx. 16 cm wide x 14–15 cm tall)

BACK PANEL PATTERN

Make 1 back panel to hold all pockets.

Foundation: Ch 61

Row 1 (RS): Hdc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across. (60 hdc)

Row 2–36: Ch 1, turn. Hdc across. (60 hdc)

Fasten off.

(Finished size approx. 48 cm wide x 72 cm tall)

TOP HANGING EDGE

With yarn, work across the top edge of the back panel.

Row 1: Sc evenly across.

Row 2: Ch 1, turn. Sc across.

Row 3: Ch 1, turn. Sc across.

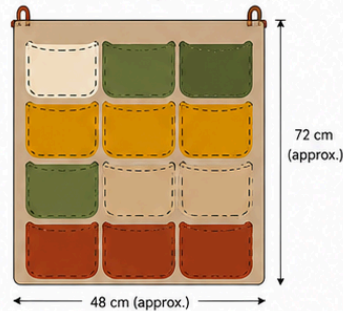
Create 2 hanging loops:

Ch 12, skip 6 sts, sl st in next st.

Repeat on the other side.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

POCKET LAYOUT (FRONT VIEW)



COLOR SUGGESTION

- Cream / Natural
- Olive Green
- Mustard Yellow
- Rust / Terracotta

Change colors as you like and enjoy your handmade organizer!



TIPS: Use a sturdy yarn for durability. Block the back panel if needed for a neat finish.

Crochet Wall Pocket Organizer – Complete Step-by-Step Tutorial

This Crochet Wall Pocket Organizer is a practical handmade project designed to keep crochet hooks, scissors, yarn, knitting needles, craft tools, and other small supplies organized and easy to reach. The finished organizer features nine individual pockets arranged in three rows, attached to a large crocheted backing panel. A wooden dowel at the top provides stability and makes the organizer easy to hang on a wall.

The tutorial uses simple stitches, making it suitable for confident beginners as well as experienced crocheters. The main construction is worked primarily in single crochet, so once you understand the basic pocket and backing measurements, the project becomes very repetitive and relaxing.

The instructions below follow the measurements, stitch counts, materials, construction method, and finishing details shown in the original tutorial graphic. All crochet terminology is written in standard US crochet terms.

Materials

For this project, you will need:

- Worsted Weight (4) cotton yarn in approximately 5 colors
- 5.0 mm (H) crochet hook
- Yarn needle
- Scissors
- Wooden dowel or sturdy wooden stick measuring approximately 12–14 inches (30–35 cm)
- 2 wall hooks or nails, optional for hanging

Cotton yarn works especially well because it creates firm, defined stitches and helps the pockets keep their shape when they are holding tools.

Finished Size

The finished organizer measures approximately:

19.7 inches (50 cm) wide × 27.5 inches (70 cm) tall

Because crochet tension varies from person to person, your finished measurements may be slightly different.

You can also customize the organizer by changing the number of stitches or rows in the backing panel and pockets.

Basic Crochet Stitches Used

Before beginning, make sure you are comfortable with the following US crochet stitches.

Chain – ch

Yarn over and pull the yarn through the loop already on your hook.

Single Crochet – sc

Insert the hook into the designated stitch. Yarn over and pull up a loop. You should have 2 loops on the hook. Yarn over again and pull through both loops.

Half Double Crochet – hdc

Yarn over, insert the hook into the stitch, yarn over and pull up a loop. You should have 3 loops on the hook. Yarn over and pull through all 3 loops.

Double Crochet – dc

Yarn over and insert the hook into the stitch. Yarn over and pull up a loop. Yarn over and pull through 2 loops. Yarn over again and pull through the remaining 2 loops.

Slip Stitch – sl st

Insert the hook into the stitch, yarn over, and pull the yarn through both the stitch and the loop already on the hook.

Although the project is constructed mainly with single crochet, knowing these standard stitches will help you understand the terminology used throughout the project.

Step 1 – Crochet the Individual Pockets

You will make 9 individual rectangular pockets.

Using your first chosen yarn color:

Foundation Chain

Ch 21.

Row 1

Beginning in the second chain from the hook, work 1 sc in each chain across.

You should have:

20 sc

Turn your work.

Rows 2–13

Ch 1.

Work 1 sc in every stitch across.

20 sc

Turn after each row.

Continue until you have completed Row 13.

Fasten off and weave in the loose end, or leave a suitable sewing tail if you prefer to use the yarn tail during assembly.

Make a total of:

9 pockets

You can make the pockets in different colors to create the color-blocked appearance shown in the tutorial.

Try to keep your tension consistent while making all nine rectangles. Since the pockets will eventually be sewn together, rectangles that are approximately the same height and width will produce a neater finished organizer.

Step 2 – Join Three Pockets to Create Each Row

Once all nine pockets are complete, divide them into groups of three.

Each group will create one horizontal row of pockets.

Place 3 pocket rectangles side by side, with their bottom and top edges aligned.

Thread your yarn needle with matching yarn.

Sew the adjoining side edges together.

Join Pocket 1 to Pocket 2, then Pocket 2 to Pocket 3.

Repeat this process with the remaining pockets.

When finished, you should have:

3 horizontal pocket rows

Each row contains:

3 pockets

Try to keep the joining stitches neat and secure without pulling them too tightly. Over-tightening the seams can cause the pockets to curl or distort.

Step 3 – Join the Three Pocket Rows

Arrange your three completed pocket rows vertically.

Place one row above another so that the pocket divisions remain aligned.

Using your yarn needle and coordinating yarn, sew the rows together.

Work carefully along the horizontal seams where the rows meet.

Keep the vertical divisions between the pockets aligned as closely as possible.

After this step, you should have one large panel consisting of:

3 pockets across × 3 pockets high

for a total of:

9 storage pockets

At this stage, the pocket panel should resemble the front section shown in the original tutorial.

Step 4 – Crochet the Backing Panel

The backing panel supports the entire pocket organizer.

Choose your backing color. In the example, a warm rust-colored yarn is used.

Foundation Chain

Ch 81.

Row 1

Beginning in the second chain from the hook, work 1 sc in each chain across.

You should have:

80 sc

Turn.

Rows 2–56

Ch 1.

Work 1 sc in every stitch across.

80 sc

Turn at the end of every row.

Continue until you have completed Row 56.

Fasten off.

Weave in the loose ends neatly.

Your backing should now be a large rectangular crochet panel.

The tutorial suggests that you may adjust the width and height if needed. If customizing the width, remember that the front organizer is based on groups of three pockets, so make sure your backing remains wide enough to comfortably support all three pockets across.

Step 5 – Attach the Pocket Panel to the Backing

Place the backing panel flat with the right side facing upward.

Position the completed nine-pocket panel over the lower portion of the backing.

Center it carefully from left to right.

Make sure the bottom edge of the pocket panel is aligned evenly.

Using your yarn needle and coordinating yarn, secure the pocket structure to the backing.

Sew across the appropriate edges of each pocket row so the rows remain attached firmly to the backing.

Keep the pocket openings accessible so they can hold crochet hooks, scissors, yarn, and other supplies.

Pay particular attention to the seams between the individual pockets. These divisions are what prevent the contents of one pocket from sliding into the next.

Work slowly around the pocket panel, checking occasionally that everything remains straight.

Do not pull your sewing yarn excessively tight. The organizer should remain flat rather than puckering around the seams.

Once attached, gently place your fingers inside each pocket to confirm that all nine storage areas remain open.

Step 6 – Create the Hanging Loops

The organizer uses crocheted loops at the upper corners for hanging.

Top Left Loop

Attach your yarn to the top-left corner of the backing.

Ch 8.

Bring the chain back toward the same corner.

Work a sl st into the same corner to form a loop.

Fasten securely.

Top Right Loop

Repeat the same process at the top-right corner.

Attach yarn.

Ch 8.

Bring the chain back to the starting corner.

Sl st into the same corner.

Secure the yarn.

You should now have one hanging loop at each upper corner.

Make sure the loops are firmly attached because they will help support the weight of the completed organizer.

Step 7 – Add the Optional Wooden Dowel Pocket

A wooden dowel can help stabilize the top of the organizer and prevent it from folding inward when filled with craft supplies.

The tutorial provides the following instructions for the dowel section:

Foundation Chain

Ch 85.

Row 1

Beginning in the second chain from the hook, work 1 sc in each chain across.

You should have:

84 sc

Turn.

Rows 2–56

Ch 1.

Work 1 sc in every stitch across.

84 sc

Turn after each row.

After completing the crocheted section, use slip stitches to attach it to the top edge of the backing, creating the area that will hold the dowel.

Insert your wooden dowel or stick through the completed top section.

The recommended dowel length shown in the tutorial is approximately:

12–14 inches / 30–35 cm

Center the dowel before hanging the organizer.

Step 8 – Weave In All Yarn Ends

Inspect the entire organizer for loose yarn tails.

Using a yarn needle, weave every loose end securely into the surrounding stitches.

Change direction once or twice while weaving the yarn through the fabric. This makes it less likely that the end will work itself loose during use or washing.

Trim excess yarn carefully with scissors.

Avoid cutting extremely close to the final stitch.

Step 9 – Shape and Finish the Organizer

Lay the organizer flat.

Straighten the backing and gently shape all nine pockets.

Check that:

- The backing lies reasonably flat.
- All 9 pockets are open.
- The pocket rows are securely attached.
- The hanging loops are secure.
- The wooden dowel sits correctly at the top.
- All loose ends have been woven in.

If necessary, gently reshape the crochet fabric by hand.

Cotton yarn responds well to light blocking, so you can also lightly block the organizer if you want straighter edges and more defined pocket shapes.

Step 10 – Insert the Wooden Dowel

Slide the wooden dowel through the top dowel section.

Center it so approximately equal amounts extend toward each side.

The dowel provides additional structural support and helps distribute the weight of the organizer.

This is especially helpful if you plan to store heavier items such as large scissors, multiple crochet hooks, pencils, or small yarn balls.

Step 11 – Hang the Organizer

Install two suitable wall hooks or nails in the location where you want to display your organizer.

Hang the organizer using the crocheted loops.

Before completely filling the pockets, make sure the wall hardware is secure enough to support the combined weight of the crochet organizer and everything you intend to store in it.

Arrange your supplies throughout the nine pockets.

You can use them for:

Crochet hooks, scissors, yarn balls, knitting needles, stitch markers, measuring tapes, pencils, craft brushes, sewing notions, small tools, or office supplies.



Your wall organizer is now ready to use!

Suggested Color Combination

The original tutorial uses a warm, earthy palette consisting of approximately five colors:

Color #1 – Cream

Use this for light neutral pockets.

Color #2 – Olive Green

This adds an earthy contrast to the neutral shades.

Color #3 – Mustard

A warm golden mustard gives the organizer a cheerful handmade appearance.

Color #4 – Beige

Beige provides another soft neutral color and works well beside cream.

Color #5 – Rust

Rust creates a rich dark accent and works especially well for the backing and lower pockets.

You do not have to follow this exact color combination. The same design could be made with pastels, farmhouse neutrals, rainbow colors, coastal shades, or even one solid color.

For the closest appearance to the tutorial, alternate cream, olive green, mustard, beige, and rust throughout the nine pockets.

How to Customize the Organizer

The tutorial can easily be adapted to your needs.

To make wider pockets, increase the number of foundation chains.

To make taller pockets, crochet additional rows.

To make a larger overall organizer, increase both the width and height of the backing panel.

You can also make fewer pockets if you only need a small organizer.

When changing the dimensions, remember that the backing should always be large enough to support the entire pocket panel without stretching.

For the original version, maintain the nine-pocket arrangement of:

3 pockets across and 3 pockets down.

Tips for the Best Results

Use cotton yarn whenever possible. It gives the organizer good durability and stitch definition.

Keep your tension fairly firm. Very loose crochet fabric may stretch when the pockets are filled.

Check the size of your pockets before assembling all nine pieces. If the first pocket is the size you want, use it as a reference while making the others.

Customize the organizer by adjusting the number of stitches and rows if your tools are particularly large or small.

This organizer is useful for much more than crochet supplies. It can also hold sewing supplies, office tools, art materials, children's craft items, or other small household objects.

Care Instructions

To help your handmade organizer maintain its shape, follow gentle care methods.

Hand wash cold.

Avoid hot water, which can affect the shape of cotton crochet.

Do not bleach.

Bleach can weaken yarn fibers and damage the colors.

Lay flat to dry.

Reshape the organizer and pockets while damp and allow the project to dry completely on a flat surface.

Iron on low heat only if needed.

If ironing is necessary, use a low setting and avoid excessive heat.

Remove the wooden dowel before washing the organizer.

Final Project Checklist

Before considering your project complete, confirm that you have:

- 9 individual crocheted pockets
- 3 pockets in each horizontal row
- 3 completed pocket rows
- 1 large backing panel
- Secure seams between every pocket
- Securely attached pocket rows
- 2 hanging loops
- An optional wooden dowel section
- A 12–14 inch (30–35 cm) wooden dowel or stick
- All yarn ends woven in
- A finished size of approximately 19.7 × 27.5 inches (50 × 70 cm)

Once everything is secure, fill each pocket with your favorite supplies and hang the organizer in your craft room, sewing area, studio, or creative corner.
