

CROCHET CAT PHONE CHARGER HOLDER

— Step-by-Step Tutorial —

Keep your phone and charger organized with this cute cat!



MATERIALS

- Medium Weight (4) 100% Cotton Yarn Beige (main) and Cream (muzzle)
- 3.0 mm (US C/2) Crochet Hook
- Fabric for pocket and hanging loop (100% cotton)
- Black felt (or fabric) for nose
- Polyester fiberfill (optional for firmness)
- Hot glue (optional)
- Yarn needle
- Scissors
- Stitch markers
- Charger (size reference)

ABBREVIATIONS (US TERMS)

inc	increase (2 sc in same stitch)

LEGEND - MAIN STITCHES

ch chain	sl st slip stitch	sc single crochet	inc increase	dec decrease	hdc half double crochet	dc double crochet

FINISHED SIZE: Approx. 20 cm (7.8 in) tall x 15 cm (5.9 in) wide (without loop)

GAUGE: 22 sc x 24 rows = 10 cm (4 in) square

1 CAT BODY (Make 2 pieces) Work in continuous rounds.



R1: ch 2, 6 sc in 2nd ch from hook. (6)
R2: [inc] around. (12)
R3: [sc, inc] around. (18)
R4: [2 sc, inc] around. (24)
R5: [3 sc, inc] around. (30)
R6-R18: sc around. (30)
R19: [3 sc, dec] around. (24)
R20: [2 sc, dec] around. (18)
R21: [sc, dec] around. (12)
R22: [dec] around. (6)
Fasten off. Join the 2 pieces with sc around, leaving the top open.
Stuff lightly if desired.

2 EARS (Make 2)



R1: ch 2, 4 sc in 2nd ch. (4)
R2: [inc] around. (8)
R3: [sc, inc] around. (12)
Fasten off, leaving a long tail.
Fold slightly and sew to the top of the body.

3 MUZZLE (Make 2 with cream yarn)



R1: ch 2, 6 sc in 2nd ch. (6)
R2: [inc] around. (12)
R3: sc around. (12)
Fasten off, leave long tail.
Place side by side at the center of the face and sew.

4 NOSE (Black felt)



Cut a small heart/triangle shape for the nose and glue or sew on top of the muzzles.

5 EMBROIDER THE FACE



Use black yarn to embroider:
• Eyes: curved lines
• Whiskers: 3 lines on each side
• Mouth: vertical line down from nose, then a small "Y" shape.

6 ARMS (Make 2)



R1: ch 7, 2 sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc across. (6)
R2-R11: sc across. (6)
Fold the piece in half and sc 3 sides to close, leaving top open.
Sew to the sides of the body.

7 FEET (Make 2)



R1: ch 2, 6 sc in 2nd ch. (6)
R2: [inc] around. (12)
R3: sc around. (12)
Sew to the bottom front of the body.

8 POCKET



Cut fabric 15 cm (6 in) wide x 12 cm (4.7 in) tall.
Fold the top edge 1 cm (0.4 in) to the inside and sew.
Sew the sides and bottom onto the front of the cat.

9 HANGING LOOP



Cut fabric 2.5 cm (1 in) wide x 16 cm (6.3 in) long.
Fold in half lengthwise, right sides together, sew along the long edge.
Turn right side out and press.
Make a loop and sew the ends to the back top of the cat.

10 ASSEMBLY



- Weave in all ends.
- Block gently if needed.
- Insert your charger through the loop and place your phone in the pocket.

Your Cat Charger Holder is ready!



TIPS

- Use a tight stitch for a firm holder.
- Add more rounds to the pocket for larger phones.
- Change colors to create your own cat!

MATERIALS

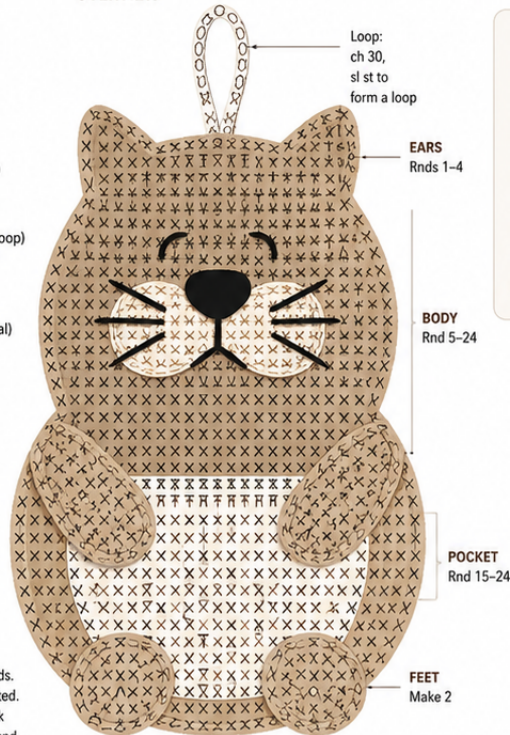
- Worsted weight cotton yarn
- Light brown
- Cream
- Black
- 2.5 mm (US C/2) crochet hook
- Floral fabric (for pocket and loop)
- Tapestry needle
- Scissors
- Stitch markers
- Hot glue (optional)

ABBREVIATIONS (US TERMS)

ch = chain
sl st = slip stitch
sc = single crochet
hdc = half double crochet
dc = double crochet
inc = increase (2 sc in same st)
dec = decrease (invisible) (sc2tog)
(...) = repeat instructions
... = repeat from * to *
st(s) = stitch(es)
rnd(s) = round(s)

Work in continuous rounds.
Do not join unless indicated.
Use stitch marker to mark the first stitch of each round.

OVERVIEW



STITCH GUIDE (KEY)

- chain (ch)
- slip stitch (sl st)
- × single crochet (sc)
- ⌣ half double crochet (hdc)
- ⌣ double crochet (dc)
- ∇ increase (inc)
- ∇ decrease (dec)
- magic ring

FACE EMBROIDERY (Use black yarn)

- backstitch for eyes and mouth
- straight stitch for whiskers
- safety nose or felt nose

ASSEMBLY

1. Crochet all parts.
2. Sew the pocket fabric to the front (before Rnd 15).
3. Embroider or attach the facial features.
4. Sew the arms and feet in place.
5. Attach the loop at the top center.
6. Weave in all ends.

BODY ROUNDS

1	6 sc in magic ring	(6)
2	inc around	(12)
3	(sc, inc) around	(18)
4	(2 sc, inc) around	(24)
5	(3 sc, inc) around	(30)
6	(4 sc, inc) around	(36)
7-14	sc around	(36)
15	sc around (front loop only)	(36)
16-24	sc around	(36)

Fasten off.

EARS (Make 2)



Rnd	Stitches	
1	4 sc in magic ring	(4)
2	inc around	(8)
3	(sc, inc) around	(12)
4	sc around	(12)

Fasten off. Flatten and sew to the top of the body.

POCKET (Front)



Rnd	Stitches	
1	ch 17, sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc across	(16)
2	ch 1, turn, sc across	(16)
3-9	sc across	(16)

Sew the pocket to the body between Rnds 15-24.

ARMS (Make 2)



Rnd	Stitches	
1	6 sc in magic ring	(6)
2-10	sc around	(6)

Flatten and sew to the sides.

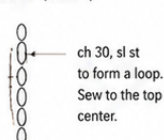
FEET (Make 2)



Rnd	Stitches	
1	6 sc in magic ring	(6)
2	inc around	(12)
3	(sc, inc) around	(18)
4	sc around	(18)

Flatten and sew to the bottom.

LOOP (Make 1)



ch 30, sl st to form a loop. Sew to the top center.

FINISHED SIZE

Approx. 18 cm (7 in) tall (including loop) × 12 cm (4.7 in) wide.



Crochet Cat Phone Charger Holder – Complete Step-by-Step Tutorial

This Crochet Cat Phone Charger Holder is a practical and adorable organizer designed to hold your phone safely while it is charging. The finished project features a crocheted cat body, a fabric pocket, embroidered facial details, small paws, and a fabric hanging loop that fits over a wall charger.

This tutorial uses US crochet terminology and follows the measurements and construction shown in the reference chart. The project is worked mainly with single crochet stitches, making it suitable for confident beginners and intermediate crocheters.

Always make sure the wall outlet, charger, cable, and phone have enough ventilation. The holder should hang below the charger and must not cover the outlet, charger ventilation openings, or electrical connections.

Finished Size and Gauge

The completed holder measures approximately:

20 cm or 7.8 inches tall

15 cm or 5.9 inches wide

These measurements do not include the hanging loop.

The recommended gauge is:

22 single crochet stitches × 24 rows = 10 cm or 4 inches square

Gauge is not as critical as it would be for a garment, but matching it will help you create a holder that is close to the intended size. A tighter fabric is preferable because it gives the

cat body more structure and prevents the phone pocket from stretching excessively.

Materials

You will need:

- Medium Weight Category 4, 100% cotton yarn
- Beige yarn for the main cat body
- Cream yarn for the muzzle
- A 3.0 mm crochet hook, approximately US size C/2
- 100% cotton fabric for the front pocket and hanging loop
- Black felt or a small piece of black fabric for the nose
- Black yarn or embroidery thread for the facial details
- Polyester fiberfill, optional
- Hot glue, optional
- Yarn needle
- Sewing needle
- Coordinating sewing thread
- Scissors
- Stitch markers
- Measuring tape or ruler
- Fabric iron
- Wall charger for size reference
- Phone for testing the pocket size

Cotton yarn is recommended because it produces a firm, durable fabric with limited stretch. Avoid very fuzzy yarn because it can make the face details less defined and may trap more heat around the charging area.

Crochet Abbreviations

The pattern uses the following US crochet abbreviations:

ch – chain

sc – single crochet

inc – increase by working 2 single crochet stitches in the same stitch

dec – decrease by combining 2 stitches into 1 stitch

hdc – half double crochet

dc – double crochet

sl st – slip stitch

() – work all instructions inside the parentheses into the same stitch when indicated

[] – repeat the instructions inside the brackets

A number in parentheses at the end of a round indicates the total number of stitches you should have after completing that round.

Basic Stitch Instructions

Chain Stitch

Make a slip knot and place it on the hook. Yarn over and pull the yarn through the loop on the hook. Repeat until you have the required number of chains.

Keep the chains relaxed and even. Tight chains can make the first round difficult to work.

Slip Stitch

Insert the hook into the indicated stitch. Yarn over and pull the yarn through the stitch and immediately through the loop already on the hook.

A slip stitch is commonly used to join rounds or move across stitches without adding height.

Single Crochet

Insert the hook into the next stitch. Yarn over and pull up a loop. You will have 2 loops on the hook.

Yarn over again and pull through both loops.

Single Crochet Increase

Work 2 single crochet stitches into the same stitch.

An increase adds one stitch and helps the piece become wider or more rounded.

Single Crochet Decrease

Insert the hook into the next stitch and pull up a loop. Insert the hook into the following stitch and pull up another loop.

You will have 3 loops on the hook. Yarn over and pull through all 3 loops.

For a cleaner finish, you may use an invisible single crochet decrease.

Before You Begin

The cat body is made from two matching pieces. One piece becomes the front and the other becomes the back.

The front section receives the muzzle, embroidered face, fabric pocket, arms, and feet. The hanging loop is attached at the top. The two body pieces are then joined around the outside edge.

The body is worked in continuous rounds. Do not join each round unless your preferred technique requires it. Place a

stitch marker in the first stitch of every round and move it upward as you work.

Count your stitches after every round. Correct stitch counts are especially important during the increase and decrease sections.

Step 1: Crochet the Cat Body

Make 2 identical cat body pieces using beige yarn.

The body begins near the top and gradually expands to form the head and lower body. It is then decreased slightly before the final rounds.

Round 1

Chain 2.

Work 6 single crochet stitches into the second chain from the hook.

You should have 6 stitches.

Round 2

Work 2 single crochet stitches in every stitch around.

You should have 12 stitches.

Round 3

Repeat the following sequence around:

1 single crochet in the next stitch, then 2 single crochet stitches in the next stitch.

You should have 18 stitches.

Round 4

Repeat the following sequence around:

2 single crochet stitches, then an increase in the next stitch.

You should have 24 stitches.

Round 5

Repeat the following sequence around:

3 single crochet stitches, then an increase in the next stitch.

You should have 30 stitches.

Rounds 6–18

Work 1 single crochet in every stitch around.

Maintain 30 stitches in each round.

These straight rounds create the main height of the cat's head and body.

Round 19

Repeat the following sequence around:

3 single crochet stitches, then a decrease.

You should have 24 stitches.

Round 20

Repeat the following sequence around:

2 single crochet stitches, then a decrease.

You should have 18 stitches.

Round 21

Repeat the following sequence around:

1 single crochet, then a decrease.

You should have 12 stitches.

Round 22

Work decreases around.

You should have 6 stitches.

Fasten off and leave a long yarn tail if you would like to use it during assembly.

Do not stuff the body heavily. The finished holder should remain relatively flat. A very small amount of fiberfill may be added later if you want slightly more dimension around the head, but the phone pocket must remain flat and stable.

Step 2: Shape the Body Pieces

Place each crocheted body piece on a flat surface.

Gently shape the upper section into a rounded cat head and the lower section into an oval body. The final silhouette should resemble a rounded cat with a slightly narrower top and fuller bottom.

Because the chart displays the ears as separate pieces, do not try to create pointed ears directly from the body rounds.

If necessary, lightly steam-block the pieces from a safe distance. Do not press a hot iron directly onto the crochet fabric.

Allow both pieces to dry completely before attaching the decorative components.

Step 3: Crochet the Ears

Make 2 ears using beige yarn.

Round 1

Chain 2.

Work 4 single crochet stitches into the second chain from the hook.

You should have 4 stitches.

Round 2

Work an increase in every stitch around.

You should have 8 stitches.

Round 3

Repeat the following sequence around:

1 single crochet, then an increase.

You should have 12 stitches.

Fasten off and leave a long tail for sewing.

Fold each ear slightly so it develops a softly pointed triangular shape. Avoid flattening it completely. A gentle curve will make the ears look more natural.

Position the ears near the upper left and upper right edges of the front body piece. Sew the lower edge of each ear securely to the body.

Make sure both ears are positioned at approximately the same height and angle.

Step 4: Crochet the Muzzle

Make 2 muzzle pieces using cream yarn.

Each muzzle piece is a small oval. When placed side by side, the two pieces form the cat's rounded cheeks.

Round 1

Chain 2.

Work 6 single crochet stitches into the second chain from the hook.

You should have 6 stitches.

Round 2

Work an increase in every stitch around.

You should have 12 stitches.

Round 3

Work 1 single crochet in every stitch around.

You should still have 12 stitches.

Fasten off and leave a long tail for sewing.

Gently shape each piece into an oval. Place the two muzzle pieces side by side in the center of the cat's face. The inner edges should touch or overlap very slightly.

Sew around the outside of each muzzle piece using cream yarn.

Keep the muzzle positioned high enough to leave room for the pocket below, but low enough that the face remains centered between the ears and the pocket opening.

Step 5: Make and Attach the Nose

Cut a small heart-shaped or softly triangular nose from black felt.

The nose should be large enough to cover the small space where the two cream muzzle pieces meet, but it should not cover too much of the muzzle.

Position the nose with the point facing downward.

You may attach it in one of two ways:

- Sew around the edge with black thread.
- Apply a small amount of hot glue to the back and press it firmly into place.

Sewing is the more durable option, especially if the holder will be handled frequently.

Step 6: Embroider the Cat's Face

Use black yarn or embroidery thread to create the facial details.

Embroider the eyes as two short curved lines above the muzzle. They should look like gently closed or smiling eyes.

Create three whiskers on each side of the muzzle. Begin near the outside edge of each cream cheek and extend the whiskers outward.

The whiskers may be slightly different lengths for a natural appearance, but keep both sides visually balanced.

To create the mouth, stitch a short vertical line downward from the bottom point of the nose. At the end of this line, embroider a small curved or Y-shaped smile.

Secure all embroidery ends on the back of the front body piece. Trim excess yarn carefully so no loose ends interfere with the pocket or assembly.

Step 7: Crochet the Arms

Make 2 arms using beige yarn.

Row 1

Chain 7.

Beginning in the second chain from the hook, work 1 single crochet in each chain across.

You should have 6 stitches.

Rows 2–11

Chain 1 and turn.

Work 1 single crochet in each stitch across.

You should have 6 stitches in every row.

Fasten off and leave a long tail for sewing.

Fold each rectangle in half lengthwise. Sew the long open edge and one short edge closed.

Leave one short edge open.

You may add a very small amount of polyester fiberfill to each arm, but do not overstuff them. The arms should remain soft and slightly flat.

Position one arm on each side of the fabric pocket. Angle them inward so they appear to be holding the phone.

Sew the open ends securely to the body. You may also add a few hidden stitches along the lower edges of the arms to keep them in position.

Step 8: Crochet the Feet

Make 2 feet using beige yarn.

Round 1

Chain 2.

Work 6 single crochet stitches into the second chain from the hook.

You should have 6 stitches.

Round 2

Work an increase in every stitch around.

You should have 12 stitches.

Round 3

Work 1 single crochet in every stitch around.

You should still have 12 stitches.

Fasten off and leave a long tail for sewing.

Gently flatten each foot into a small oval.

Position the feet near the bottom front of the cat body, one on the left and one on the right. Angle them slightly outward or upward to create a relaxed sitting position.

Sew them securely to the front body piece.

For additional detail, you may embroider short curved lines on the feet to suggest toes, although this detail is optional and is not required by the chart.

Step 9: Cut the Fabric Pocket

Cut a piece of cotton fabric measuring:

15 cm or 6 inches wide

12 cm or 4.7 inches tall

The floral fabric shown in the chart coordinates with the neutral yarn, but you may choose any tightly woven cotton print.

Press the fabric before folding the edges.

Fold the top edge approximately:

1 cm or 0.4 inch toward the wrong side

Press the fold and sew it in place to create a neat finished upper edge.

Next, fold the left, right, and bottom edges slightly toward the wrong side. Press these folds carefully.

The top edge must remain open because this is where the phone will be inserted.

Before sewing the pocket to the cat, place your phone on top of the fabric to check the size. The pocket should hold the lower portion of the phone securely without covering the charging port.

Larger phones may require a slightly wider or taller fabric piece. The original chart recommends adding more crochet rounds or adjusting the pocket for larger devices.

Step 10: Sew the Pocket to the Body

Place the prepared fabric pocket on the lower front section of the cat body.

Center it horizontally.

The finished top edge should face upward, and the folded raw edges should be hidden underneath.

Pin or clip the pocket temporarily in place.

Sew along the left side, bottom edge, and right side. Do not sew the top edge closed.

Use small, strong stitches. Backstitching by hand is a good choice because it creates a durable seam.

Do not sew through the back body piece at this stage. The pocket should be attached only to the front body piece.

Check that the pocket opening is wide enough for your phone and that the charging port remains accessible.

Step 11: Position the Arms Around the Pocket

Place one crocheted arm on each side of the pocket.

The upper ends should be attached near the side edges of the body. The lower portions should rest over the pocket, giving the appearance that the cat is hugging the phone.

Sew each arm securely at the top.

Add a few discreet stitches where the arms cross over the pocket. Do not sew through an area that would prevent the phone from sliding in and out.

Test the pocket again after attaching the arms.

The phone should fit securely without being squeezed too tightly.

Step 12: Make the Fabric Hanging Loop

Cut a fabric strip measuring:

2.5 cm or 1 inch wide

16 cm or 6.3 inches long

Fold the strip in half lengthwise with the right sides of the fabric together.

Sew along the long open edge using a narrow seam allowance.

Turn the fabric tube right side out.

Press it flat, placing the seam along the back or side.

Bring the two short ends together to form a loop. Make sure the strip is not twisted.

Sew the ends securely to the upper back section of the cat body.

The loop should be large enough to fit over the wall charger but not so long that the cat hangs too far below it.

Test the loop with the intended charger before completing the final assembly.

Step 13: Prepare the Front and Back Pieces

Lay the finished front body piece face up.

Check that all components are secure:

- **Both ears are attached.**
- **The two cream muzzle pieces are centered.**
- **The black nose is secure.**
- **The eyes, whiskers, and mouth are embroidered.**
- **The fabric pocket is sewn along three edges.**
- **Both arms are attached.**
- **Both feet are attached.**
- **The hanging loop is securely sewn at the top.**

Place the second body piece behind the decorated front piece.

Align the outer edges carefully.

The wrong sides should face each other, leaving the finished sides visible on the front and back.

Use stitch markers or sewing clips to hold the two layers together.

Step 14: Join the Cat Body Pieces

Using beige yarn and a yarn needle, sew the two body pieces together around the outside edge.

You may also join the pieces with single crochet stitches if you prefer a more decorative border.

Begin near one side of the top section and work evenly around the body.

Make sure the stitches pass through both layers.

Keep the seam firm but not so tight that the body puckers.

Leave the upper area open briefly if you would like to add a very small amount of polyester fiberfill. Add only enough stuffing to provide gentle structure.

Do not stuff the lower pocket area heavily. A thick or rounded lower body can cause the phone to tilt outward.

After adding the optional filling, close the remaining opening.

Fasten off securely and weave in all ends.

Step 15: Final Assembly Check

Insert the wall charger through the fabric hanging loop.

Allow the cat holder to hang below the charger.

Insert the phone into the fabric pocket and connect the charging cable.

Check the following points:

- The phone rests securely inside the pocket.
- The charging port is not blocked.
- The cable is not sharply bent.
- The cat does not cover the wall outlet.
- The holder does not pull the charger away from the outlet.
- The fabric loop remains stable.
- The phone is not pressing heavily against the charging plug.
- Air can circulate around the charger and phone.

Block the holder gently if the body twists or curls. Lay it flat, shape it with your hands, and allow it to dry completely.

Tips for a Firm and Professional Finish

Use a tight, even crochet tension. A firm fabric will help the cat maintain its shape.

Cotton yarn is ideal because it stretches less than many acrylic yarns and gives the body a neat, structured appearance.

Use a hook that is slightly smaller than the yarn label recommends if your stitches are naturally loose.

Keep the pocket slightly wider than the phone. The phone should slide inside easily but should not fall out when the holder is lifted.

Reinforce the top corners of the pocket because these areas receive the most stress.

Reinforce the hanging loop with several rows of strong hand stitches.

For a larger phone, increase the size of both body pieces and the fabric pocket proportionally. You may add more straight rounds to the body after Round 18 or use a slightly thicker yarn and larger hook.

Change the yarn, fabric, nose shape, or facial expression to create a customized cat.

You can also make a striped cat, a black cat, a gray cat, or a calico-inspired version by changing yarn colors during the body rounds.

Safe Use Instructions

This item is a decorative phone holder and organizer. It is not an electrical accessory.

Do not place the crochet fabric between the charger plug and the wall outlet.

Do not cover the charger.

Do not use the holder with damaged cables, loose outlets, overheating chargers, or chargers that do not fit securely in the wall.

Keep the crochet holder away from water, sinks, stoves, heaters, and other heat sources.

Stop using it immediately if the phone, charger, cable, fabric, or yarn becomes unusually warm.

For heavier phones, consider hanging the organizer from a separate wall hook near the outlet rather than placing the entire weight on the charger.

Care Instructions

Spot clean the holder only.

Use a damp cloth with a small amount of mild soap to clean the yarn or fabric.

Do not bleach.

Do not tumble dry.

Do not iron the crocheted sections.

Lay the holder flat to dry.

The fabric pocket and loop may be pressed carefully before assembly, but avoid direct heat on the finished crochet piece, felt nose, embroidery, and any glued areas.

Allow the holder to dry completely before placing it near an electrical outlet.

Final Result

Your Crochet Cat Phone Charger Holder is now complete. The finished cat should have a firm beige body, two pointed ears, a cream-colored muzzle, a black nose, embroidered whiskers and eyes, a floral fabric pocket, two small arms, two rounded feet, and a secure fabric hanging loop.

Place the phone gently inside the pocket, guide the charging cable without bending it sharply, and enjoy a charming handmade organizer that keeps the phone and cord together while charging.
