



CROCHET DAISY COASTER

STEP-BY-STEP TUTORIAL

These cute daisy coasters are perfect for your cozy moments! They are beginner-friendly, quick to make, and a great way to use cotton yarn. Make them in your favorite colors!



MATERIALS

- Worsted Weight Cotton Yarn (4 colors)
 - Yellow (Center)
 - Cream (Petals)
 - Pink or Green (optional)
- 5.0 mm (H) Crochet Hook
- Yarn Needle
- Scissors



ABBREVIATIONS (US TERMS)

mr = magic ring	tr = treble crochet
ch = chain	dc2tog = double crochet 2 together
sl st = slip stitch	st(s) = stitch(es)
sc = single crochet	rep = repeat
hdc = half double crochet	() = work instructions in parentheses in same stitch
dc = double crochet	

FINISHED SIZE

Approx. 12–13 cm (4.7–5 in) in diameter.

STEP-BY-STEP INSTRUCTIONS

1 CENTER (Make with yellow yarn)

Round 1: Make a magic ring, ch 1 (does not count as st), 6 sc into the ring, pull the tail to close the ring. (6 sc)

Round 2: 2 sc in each st around. (12 sc)

Round 3: [sc in next st, 2 sc in next st] around. (18 sc)
Fasten off and weave in ends.



2 PETALS (Make with cream yarn)

Attach cream yarn in any stitch of Round 3.

Ch 3 (counts as dc), 11 dc in the same stitch, sl st in next stitch on the circle.

Repeat from * to * around (you will have 18 petals).

Fasten off and weave in ends.



3 (OPTIONAL) 2ND LAYER

For a thicker coaster, make another set of petals.

Attach yarn in the back loops of Round 3.

Repeat the petal pattern (Ch 3, 11 dc in same st, sl st in next st) around.



4 (OPTIONAL) BACKING

For extra durability, you can add a round of single crochet on the back.

Attach yarn on the back side of the center.

Round: Ch 1, sc in each st around, sl st to join.
Fasten off and weave in ends.



STITCH GUIDE (US TERMS)

SLIP KNOT



Make a loop, insert hook, yarn over and pull through the loop. Place on hook.

MAGIC RING



Wrap yarn, insert hook and pull up a loop, ch 1, work stitches into the ring, pull the tail to close.

CHAIN (CH)



Yarn over, pull through the loop on hook.

SINGLE CROCHET (SC)



Insert hook into stitch, yarn over, pull up a loop, yarn over, pull through both loops.

HALF DOUBLE CROCHET (HDC)



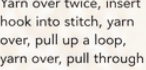
Yarn over, insert hook into stitch, yarn over, pull up a loop, yarn over, pull through all 3 loops.

DOUBLE CROCHET (DC)



Yarn over, insert hook into stitch, yarn over, pull up a loop, yarn over, pull through 2 loops, yarn over, pull through last 2 loops.

TREBLE CROCHET (TR)



Yarn over twice, insert hook into stitch, yarn over, pull up a loop, yarn over, pull through 2 loops, yarn over, pull through last 2 loops.

COLOR IDEAS



Classic Cream



Spring Pink



Garden Green



Pastel Mix

CARE INSTRUCTIONS

- Hand wash gently in cold water.
- Lay flat to dry.
- Do not bleach.
- Do not wring.



TIPS

- Use 100% cotton yarn for best absorption.
- Block lightly if needed to shape the petals.

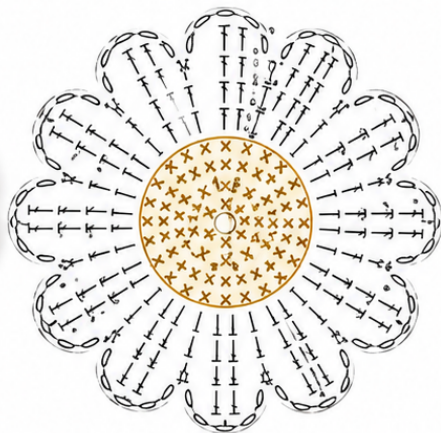

DAISY COASTER – CROCHET PATTERN

Finished size: approx. 12–13 cm (4.7–5 in) in diameter

Skill level: Easy



STITCH KEY (US TERMS)

- Chain (ch)
- Slip stitch (sl st)
- × Single crochet (sc)
- T Half double crochet (hdc)
- ⌋ Double crochet (dc)
- ⌋ 2 Double crochet together (dc2tog)

MATERIALS

- Cotton yarn:
 - Center: yellow (approx. 10 g)
 - Petals: cream (approx. 25 g)
- Crochet hook: 3.0 mm
- Yarn needle
- Scissors

ABBREVIATIONS (US TERMS)

- ch = chain
- sl st = slip stitch
- sc = single crochet
- hdc = half double crochet
- dc = double crochet
- dc2tog = 2 double crochet together

PATTERN INSTRUCTIONS

CENTER (Yellow)

Rnd 1: Magic ring, ch 1, 6 sc in ring. Join with sl st to first sc. (6 sc)

Rnd 2: Ch 1, 2 sc in each st around. Join with sl st. (12 sc)

Rnd 3: Ch 1, *1 sc, 2 sc in next st* repeat around. Join with sl st. (18 sc)

Rnd 4: Ch 1, *2 sc, 2 sc in next st* repeat around. Join with sl st. (24 sc)

Fasten off.

PETALS (Cream)

Join cream yarn in any stitch of Rnd 4. Each petal is worked over 2 stitches.

Petal (make 12):

Ch 1, in same st work: 1 sc, 1 hdc, 5 dc, 1 hdc, 1 sc, sl st in next st.

Sl st into the next stitch (this is the base center between petals).

Repeat from * around until you have 12 petals.

Join with sl st to first sc of the first petal.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

CROCHET HOOK GUIDE

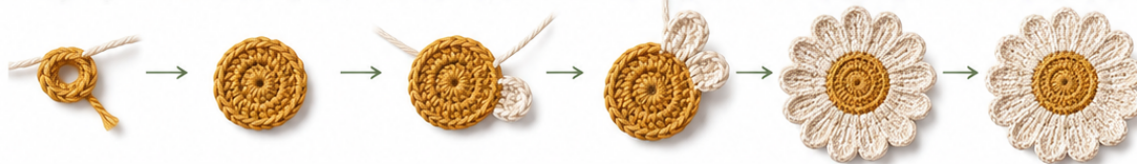
- 2.5 mm – For fine yarn
- 3.0 mm – Recommended for this pattern
- 3.5 mm – For a looser look

TIPS

- Use 100% cotton yarn for best shape and durability.
- Block the coaster gently to open the petals.
- You can change colors to create different looks!

STEP-BY-STEP VISUAL GUIDE

- 1 Magic ring
- 2 Rounds 1–4 (center)
- 3 Join cream yarn
- 4 Work first petal
- 5 Continue around
- 6 Finish – 12 petals

Crochet Daisy Coaster Tutorial

These crochet daisy coasters are inspired by the flower-shaped pieces shown in the reference photo. Each coaster features a textured golden-yellow center surrounded by twelve rounded petals. The finished flowers can be made in cream, dusty pink, sage green, or any color that complements your home décor.

This tutorial uses standard U.S. crochet terminology and explains every stage in detail. Because the original project is shown only in a finished photograph, the instructions below recreate its appearance as closely and consistently as possible while producing a practical, flat, and durable coaster.

Finished Size and Project Details

Each completed flower should measure approximately:

- 5 to 5½ inches across
- About ⅛ to ¼ inch thick
- Twelve rounded petals
- A center measuring approximately 2 inches across

The final size may vary depending on your yarn, hook, tension, and blocking method.

This is an advanced beginner to intermediate crochet project. You should be comfortable making basic stitches, working in joined rounds, crocheting into back loops, and creating several stitches in the same stitch.

One coaster usually takes approximately 30 to 45 minutes once you are familiar with the pattern.

Materials You Will Need

For each flower coaster, gather the following supplies:

- **Worsted-weight cotton yarn, size 4**
- **Golden yellow or mustard yarn for the flower center**
- **Cream, dusty pink, sage green, or another color for the petals**
- **U.S. size G/6 crochet hook, 4.0 mm**
- **Yarn needle**
- **Small scissors**
- **Stitch marker**
- **Measuring tape**
- **Rustproof blocking pins**
- **Blocking mat or thick folded towel**

Cotton yarn is strongly recommended because it absorbs moisture, tolerates warm cups, and keeps its shape better than many synthetic fibers.

Avoid using fuzzy yarn because it can hide the stitch definition. Smooth cotton yarn will make the center texture and individual petals much easier to see.

You will need only a small amount of each color.

Approximately 12 to 18 yards of yellow yarn and 30 to 40 yards of petal-colored yarn should be enough for one coaster.

Yarn Color Suggestions

To reproduce the natural palette visible in the reference image, consider using:

- **Mustard yellow for every flower center**
- **Warm ivory or natural cream for classic daisies**
- **Dusty blush pink for a soft romantic flower**
- **Muted sage green for an earthy farmhouse flower**

You can create a coordinated set by keeping every center the same color and changing only the petal colors.

For a more traditional daisy, use a bright yellow center with white petals.

For fall décor, try rust, terracotta, olive green, and golden yellow.

For spring décor, try pale pink, lavender, mint, butter yellow, and cream.

Crochet Abbreviations in U.S. Terms

The following abbreviations are used throughout the pattern:

- ch: chain
- sl st: slip stitch
- sc: single crochet
- hdc: half double crochet
- dc: double crochet
- tr: treble crochet
- st: stitch
- sts: stitches
- BLO: back loop only
- FLO: front loop only
- MR: magic ring
- rep: repeat
- sk: skip
- yo: yarn over

A number written before a stitch tells you how many times to make that stitch. For example, “3 dc” means to make three double crochet stitches.

Instructions inside parentheses are worked into the same stitch or space unless stated otherwise.

Instructions inside brackets are repeated the indicated number of times.

Important Pattern Notes

The flower is worked in two main sections.

First, you will crochet a circular yellow center. The center is made with joined rounds to create an even, textured disk.

Next, you will attach the petal color and work twelve individual petals around the outside of the center.

The beginning chains do not count as stitches unless specifically stated.

Join each round with a slip stitch to the first true stitch of the round.

Place a stitch marker in the first stitch of every round. This will help you count accurately and prevent accidental increases.

Keep your tension relaxed. Tight stitches can cause the center to curl and can make the petals difficult to shape.

The coaster should lie mostly flat before blocking. A slight wave around the petals is normal and will disappear after the final blocking stage.

How to Make a Magic Ring

Wrap the yarn around two fingers to create a loop.

Insert the crochet hook through the loop, yarn over, and pull up a loop.

Chain one to secure the ring.

Work the required stitches directly into the center of the ring.

When the stitches are complete, hold them with one hand and gently pull the yarn tail with the other hand.

Continue pulling until the center hole closes completely.

Join the round as directed.

Leave a tail long enough to weave securely through several stitches later.

Step 1: Crochet the Yellow Flower Center

Using the mustard or golden-yellow yarn, make a magic ring.

Center Round 1

Chain 1.

Work 8 single crochet stitches into the magic ring.

Pull the yarn tail to close the ring tightly.

Join with a slip stitch to the first single crochet.

You should have 8 stitches.

The center may look very small at this stage, but it will expand quickly during the following rounds.

Center Round 2

Chain 1.

Work 2 single crochet stitches in every stitch around.

Join with a slip stitch to the first single crochet.

You should have 16 stitches.

This increase round begins forming a flat circular disk.

Center Round 3

Chain 1.

Work the following sequence around:

[1 single crochet in the next stitch, 2 single crochet in the following stitch] eight times.

Join with a slip stitch to the first single crochet.

You should have 24 stitches.

Check that your circle remains flat. If the center begins to cup, loosen your tension slightly.

Center Round 4

Chain 1.

Work the following sequence around:

[1 single crochet in each of the next 2 stitches, 2 single crochet in the following stitch] eight times.

Join with a slip stitch to the first single crochet.

You should have 32 stitches.

Center Round 5

Chain 1.

Work the following sequence around:

[1 single crochet in each of the next 3 stitches, 2 single crochet in the following stitch] eight times.

Join with a slip stitch to the first single crochet.

You should have 40 stitches.

This round creates a generous yellow center similar to the one shown in the finished flowers.

Do not fasten off yet.

Step 2: Create the Raised Texture in the Center

The yellow center in the reference design has a slightly raised, spiral-like texture. This optional surface round adds dimension without making the coaster too bulky.

Chain 1.

Working in the back loops only, make 1 slip stitch loosely in each stitch around.

Join with a slip stitch to the first stitch.

Do not pull these slip stitches tightly. Tight slip stitches may cause the center to curl.

Fasten off the yellow yarn, leaving a 6-inch tail.

Turn the center over and weave the yarn tail through the back of several stitches.

Change direction and weave through another group of stitches before trimming the excess.

The textured yellow circle should measure approximately 1¾ to 2 inches across.

Step 3: Prepare the Center for Twelve Petals

The center contains 40 stitches, while the flower will have twelve petals. To distribute the petals evenly, some petals will use three base stitches and others will use four base stitches.

Attach the petal-colored yarn to any stitch using a slip stitch.

As you work around the center, follow this base distribution:

- **Petal 1 over 3 stitches**
- **Petal 2 over 3 stitches**
- **Petal 3 over 4 stitches**

- Petal 4 over 3 stitches
- Petal 5 over 3 stitches
- Petal 6 over 4 stitches
- Petal 7 over 3 stitches
- Petal 8 over 3 stitches
- Petal 9 over 4 stitches
- Petal 10 over 3 stitches
- Petal 11 over 3 stitches
- Petal 12 over 4 stitches

This sequence uses all 40 stitches and keeps the petals balanced.

Place stitch markers around the center before beginning the petals. Mark each petal section so you can see where one petal ends and the next begins.

Step 4: Crochet the First Rounded Petal

The petals are worked directly from the edge of the yellow center.

For the first petal, work across the next three center stitches.

Slip stitch into the first marked stitch.

Chain 2.

Work the following stitches into the same stitch:

- 1 half double crochet
- 2 double crochet

In the next center stitch, work:

- 2 treble crochet
- Chain 1
- 2 treble crochet

In the third center stitch, work:

- **2 double crochet**
- **1 half double crochet**

Chain 2.

Slip stitch into the same third center stitch.

The first petal is complete.

The chain stitches at the beginning and end create a soft tapered connection to the flower center.

The treble crochet stitches form the highest point of the petal, while the half double and double crochet stitches create rounded sides.

Step 5: Crochet a Petal Over Four Base Stitches

For every petal section containing four center stitches, use the following instructions.

Slip stitch into the first stitch of the marked section.

Chain 2.

In the same stitch, work:

- **1 half double crochet**
- **1 double crochet**

In the second stitch, work:

- **2 double crochet**
- **1 treble crochet**

In the third stitch, work:

- **1 treble crochet**
- **Chain 1**

- 1 treble crochet
- 2 double crochet

In the fourth stitch, work:

- 1 double crochet
- 1 half double crochet

Chain 2.

Slip stitch into the same fourth stitch.

This slightly wider petal should visually match the three-stitch petals after blocking.

Do not worry if the petals are not perfectly identical before shaping. The small variations help distribute them evenly around the circular center.

Step 6: Complete All Twelve Petals

Continue working around the center according to the marked sections.

Use the three-stitch petal instructions for sections containing three stitches.

Use the four-stitch petal instructions for sections containing four stitches.

After completing each petal, gently push it outward before beginning the next one. This will help you see the next marked section clearly.

Count the petals as you work.

You should have:

- Three petals
- Six petals

- Nine petals
- Twelve petals at the end of the round

After the twelfth petal, join with a slip stitch near the base of the first petal.

Fasten off, leaving a 6-inch yarn tail.

Weave the tail securely through the back of the petal stitches.

Step 7: Add Definition Around Each Petal

This optional edging creates a firmer outline and makes the petals look more polished.

Attach the petal-colored yarn at the base of any petal.

Work one slip stitch into each stitch along the outside edge of the petal.

At the chain-1 point near the top of the petal, work:

- 1 slip stitch
- Chain 1
- 1 slip stitch

Continue making one slip stitch in each stitch down the opposite side of the petal.

Slip stitch into the base between the current petal and the next petal.

Repeat the same process around every petal.

Keep the slip stitches loose. If they are worked too tightly, the petals will curl upward.

After edging all twelve petals, join with a slip stitch.

Fasten off and weave in the yarn end.

This step is optional. Leave it out for a softer and more flexible flower.

Step 8: Shape the Petals

Lay the flower flat with the right side facing upward.

Use your fingers to spread the twelve petals evenly around the center.

Gently pull each petal outward from its base.

Round the top of each petal by pressing the tallest stitches outward.

Make sure the gaps between the petals are approximately equal.

Measure across the flower from the tip of one petal to the tip of the opposite petal.

The flower should measure approximately 5 to 5½ inches across.

If one petal appears larger than the others, gently reshape it rather than pulling out the stitches immediately. Blocking will correct many small differences.

Step 9: Weave In All Yarn Ends Securely

Turn the flower over.

Thread one yarn tail through the eye of a yarn needle.

Pass the needle horizontally through the back loops of several stitches.

Pull the tail through without tightening the fabric.

Change direction and weave through another group of stitches.

For extra security, change direction a second time.

Trim the yarn close to the fabric.

Repeat this process for every remaining yarn tail.

Do not simply cut the yarn near the final stitch. Coasters are handled and washed frequently, so loose ends must be woven securely.

Step 10: Block the Crochet Flower

Blocking is essential for creating smooth, evenly spaced petals.

Fill a bowl with cool or lukewarm water.

Place the flower in the water and allow it to soak for approximately 10 minutes.

Gently remove the flower.

Press out the excess water between your hands. Do not twist or wring the crochet.

Place the flower between two clean towels and press firmly to remove additional moisture.

Transfer the flower to a blocking mat.

Arrange all twelve petals evenly.

Pin the tip and sides of each petal as needed.

Check that the center remains circular.

Allow the flower to dry completely before removing the pins.

For a faster method, lightly mist the flower with clean water instead of soaking it.

Step 11: Make the Coaster Thicker

The flowers in the reference image appear substantial and softly padded. You can create a thicker coaster by adding a simple backing circle.

Using the petal color or a coordinating neutral yarn, make another circular piece.

Begin with a magic ring.

Round 1: Work 8 single crochet into the ring.

Round 2: Work 2 single crochet in each stitch around. You will have 16 stitches.

Round 3: Repeat [1 single crochet, 2 single crochet in the next stitch] around. You will have 24 stitches.

Round 4: Repeat [1 single crochet in each of the next 2 stitches, 2 single crochet in the next stitch] around. You will have 32 stitches.

Round 5: Repeat [1 single crochet in each of the next 3 stitches, 2 single crochet in the next stitch] around. You will have 40 stitches.

Fasten off and block the circle.

Place the backing circle behind the yellow center. The backing should cover the center but should not extend underneath the full length of the petals.

Using matching yarn and a yarn needle, sew the backing circle to the underside of the flower.

Work small stitches around the outer edge of the backing.

Do not sew through the front surface of the yellow center.

This method creates a thicker center and hides the back of the petal attachments.

Step 12: Create a Full Flower-Shaped Backing

For a more padded coaster, make two complete flower pieces.

Crochet the first flower using the full pattern.

Crochet a second flower in the same colors or in one solid color.

Place the two flowers together with the wrong sides facing each other.

Align all twelve petals carefully.

Attach matching yarn at the base of any petal.

Working through both layers, slip stitch around the edge of each petal.

Continue around the entire flower.

Before closing the last petal, check that both layers remain flat.

Do not add stuffing. A stuffed coaster may become unstable under a cup.

Close the remaining section, fasten off, and weave in the yarn end.

This double-layer method creates a sturdy trivet-like flower suitable for larger mugs or small teapots.

Step 13: Make a Dusty Pink Flower

Use mustard yellow for the center and dusty blush pink for the petals.

Follow the complete pattern without changing the stitch counts.

A muted pink creates the soft vintage appearance seen in the reference image.

For a warmer result, choose a pink yarn with peach or beige undertones.

For a cooler result, choose a rose or mauve-toned pink.

Keep the same hook size for every coaster in the set so the flowers remain consistent.

Step 14: Make a Sage Green Flower

Use golden mustard yarn for the center and muted sage green yarn for the petals.

Complete all five center rounds in yellow.

Change to green before beginning the petal sections.

Sage green provides an earthy contrast against the yellow center.

This color combination works especially well with natural wood, ceramic cups, linen napkins, and farmhouse décor.

Block the green flower to the same measurements as the pink and cream flowers.

Step 15: Make a Cream Daisy

Use mustard yellow for the center and warm cream or ivory yarn for the petals.

Avoid very bright optical white if you want the flower to match the warm neutral style shown in the reference image.

Natural cotton, ecru, oatmeal, and ivory are all suitable choices.

Cream petals may show stains more easily, so washable cotton yarn is particularly helpful.

Make several cream flowers for a classic matching set, or combine them with pink and green flowers.

Step 16: Adjust the Size of the Coaster

To make a smaller coaster, stop the yellow center after Round 4.

The center will have 32 stitches.

Create eight petals instead of twelve, using four center stitches for each petal.

To make a larger flower, add one more increase round to the center.

After Round 5, work:

[1 single crochet in each of the next 4 stitches, 2 single crochet in the following stitch] eight times.

You will have 48 stitches.

Divide the 48 stitches into twelve sections of four stitches each.

Use the four-stitch petal instructions for every section.

A larger flower should measure approximately 6 to 6½ inches across, depending on your tension.

Step 17: Fix Common Problems

If the yellow center curls into a bowl, your stitches may be too tight. Try using a larger hook or loosening your tension.

If the center becomes very wavy, you may have added too many stitches. Count every round carefully and remove any accidental increases.

If the petals curl upward, the edging slip stitches may be too tight. Remove the edging or remake it with a larger hook.

If the petals overlap heavily, your yarn may be thicker than standard worsted-weight cotton. Use a smaller number of stitches in each petal or switch to a thinner yarn.

If the flower will not lie flat, wet block it and pin each petal separately.

If the center hole remains visible, pull the magic-ring tail more firmly and weave it in securely.

If the petals look uneven, check that you used the correct three-stitch and four-stitch distribution.

If your coaster is much larger than expected, use a smaller hook or lighter-weight yarn.

Step 18: Care and Washing Instructions

Hand washing will help the flowers maintain their shape for the longest time.

Fill a basin with cool water and add a small amount of mild detergent.

Gently press the coaster into the water.

Do not scrub or twist the petals.

Rinse thoroughly in cool water.

Press out excess water with a towel.

Reshape the flower and allow it to dry flat.

Many cotton yarns are machine washable, but always check the yarn label before washing.

Place the coasters inside a mesh laundry bag if using a washing machine.

Use a gentle cycle and cool water.

Avoid high heat because cotton may shrink.

Do not hang the flowers while wet, as the weight of the water may stretch the petals.

Step 19: Make a Coordinated Set

A balanced set can contain four, six, or eight flower coasters.

For a four-piece set, make:

- **One dusty pink flower**
- **One sage green flower**
- **Two cream flowers**

For a six-piece set, make:

- **Two dusty pink flowers**
- **Two sage green flowers**
- **Two cream flowers**

Keep every yellow center identical to create visual consistency.

Block all the flowers to the same diameter.

Stack the finished coasters with the petals slightly offset for an attractive display.

Tie the stack with cotton ribbon or natural twine if you are giving the set as a handmade gift.

Step 20: Optional Finishing Ideas

Sew a small fabric label to the back of one petal.

Add a hanging loop to one flower and use it as kitchen décor.

Use thicker cotton yarn to transform the design into a small trivet.

Join several flowers together to create a decorative table mat.

Use finer cotton yarn and a smaller hook to create appliqués for bags, placemats, or pillows.

Embroider a small ring of French knots around the yellow center for additional texture.

Keep decorative additions flat so cups remain stable when placed on the coaster.

Final Stitch Checklist

Before considering the coaster finished, confirm that:

- **The yellow center is flat and circular**
- **All yarn ends are securely woven in**
- **The flower has twelve petals**
- **The petals are evenly spaced**
- **The coaster measures approximately 5 to 5½ inches**
- **The underside is neat**
- **The coaster has been blocked**
- **A cup sits flat and stable in the center**

Your finished crochet daisy coaster should now have a warm textured center, rounded dimensional petals, and the cozy handmade appearance of the flowers shown in the reference image. By repeating the same pattern in cream, dusty pink, and sage green, you can create a coordinated floral set for a coffee table, breakfast nook, kitchen, or handmade gift.
