SUNFLOWER • DAISY • TULIP

BEAUTIFUL • PRACTICAL • HANDMADE

MATERIALS

- Worsted weight (4) cotton yarn
 - Green
 - Yellow
 - Brown
 - White
 - Red
- Crochet hook 4.0 mm (G/6)
- Yarn needle
- Scissors
- Stitch markers (optional)

FINISHED SIZE

Pocket: approx.
12 cm (4.75 in) tall
11 cm (4.25 in) wide
Flower height: approx.
6–7 cm (2.5–2.75 in)



STITCH LEGEND (US TERMS)

ch - chain
sl st - slip stitch
sc - single crochet
dc - double crochet
hdc - half double crochet
tr - treble crochet
inc - increase (2 sc in same st)
dec - decrease
sc2tog - single crochet 2 together

ABBREVIATIONS

st(s) - stitch(es)
yo - yarn over
rep - repeat
RS - right side
WS - wrong side
... - repeat between asterisks

1. CROCHET THE POCKET (MAKE 2)

1 Ch 15.

Row 1: sc in 2nd ch from hook and in each ch across. (14 sc)

Row 2–12: ch 1, turn, sc across. (14 sc)



2 Fold rectangle in half and sl st or sew the sides together to form a pocket.



3 LEAVES (MAKE 2)

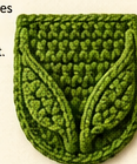
Ch 10.

Row 1: sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc in next 7, hdc in last.

Row 2: sl st, sc, sc, sc, hdc, dc, hdc, sc, sl st. Fasten off leaving tail for sewing.



4 Sew the leaves on the front of the pocket.



2. FLOWER PATTERNS

SUNFLOWER (MAKE 1)

CENTER (BROWN)

Ch 4, join with sl st to form a ring.
Rnd 1: ch 1, 6 sc in ring, join. (6)
Rnd 2: inc in each st around. (12)
Rnd 3: (sc, inc) around. (18)
Rnd 4: (2 sc, inc) around. (24)
Fasten off.



PETALS (YELLOW)

Join yellow yarn in any st from Rnd 4.
Ch 1, (dc, tr, dc) in same st, sl st in next st.
Rep *...* around. (12 petals)
Fasten off.



DAISY (MAKE 1)

CENTER (YELLOW)

Ch 4, join with sl st to form a ring.
Rnd 1: ch 1, 6 sc in ring, join. (6)
Rnd 2: inc in each st around. (12)
Rnd 3: (sc, inc) around. (18)
Fasten off.



PETALS (WHITE)

Join white yarn in any st from Rnd 3.
Ch 1, (dc, tr, dc, ch 1, sl st in next st). Rep *...* around. (12 petals)
Fasten off.



TULIP (MAKE 1)

PETALS (RED) – MAKE 3

Ch 10.
Row 1: sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc in next 7, hdc in last.
Row 2: sl st, sc, hdc, dc, hdc, sc, sl st.
Fasten off leaving tail.



ASSEMBLE TULIP

Arrange 3 petals slightly overlapping and sew the bottom edges together.



3. ASSEMBLE THE FLOWERS TO THE POCKETS

SUNFLOWER



Sew the sunflower behind the pocket.

DAISY



Sew the daisy behind the pocket.

TULIP



Sew the tulip behind the pocket.

4. FINISHING

1. Weave in all ends using a yarn needle.



2. Block lightly to shape if needed.



3. Insert cutlery and enjoy your beautiful flower pockets!



1. Crochet pocket rectangle.



2. Fold and sew sides.



3. Crochet leaves.



4. Sew leaves to pocket.



5. Make flower (center + petals).



6. Sew flower behind pocket.



7. Repeat for all 3 flower types.

TIPS

- Use 100% cotton yarn for durability and easy washing.
- Adjust hook size for tighter or looser stitches.
- These pockets are perfect for table settings, gift sets, or home décor.



Hand wash cold



Lay flat to dry



Do not bleach



Do not iron

CROCHET FLOWER CUTLERY POCKETS

Sunflower • Daisy • Tulip

MATERIALS

- Worsted weight cotton yarn
- Colors: green, yellow, brown, white, red (or your choice)
- 4.0 mm (G) crochet hook
- Yarn needle
- Scissors

STITCH KEY (US TERMS)

- o ch Chain
- ~ sl st Slip stitch
- x sc Single crochet
- ⏏ hdc Half double crochet
- ⏏ dc Double crochet
- ⏏ tr Treble crochet
- ⏏ inc Increase (2 sts in same st)
- ⏏ dec Decrease (invisible)
- () Repeat instructions
- [] Total stitches

1. LEAF POCKET (Make 2 Leaves and join)

Make 2 identical leaves.
Ch 12.

Row 1: sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc in each ch across, ch 1, turn. [11]

Row 2: sc across, ch 1, turn. [11]

Row 3: hdc across, ch 1, turn. [11]

Row 4: dc across, ch 1, turn. [11]

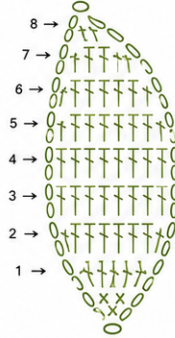
Row 5: dc dec, dc across, dc dec. [9]

Row 6: dc dec, hdc across, dc dec. [7]

Row 7: hdc dec, hdc across, hdc dec. [5]

Row 8: sc dec, sc across, sc dec. [3]

Fasten off, leave long tail.
Make 2 leaves.



Join the 2 leaves:
Place the leaves back to back. Whipstitch or sl st around the sides and bottom. Leave the top open to form the pocket.

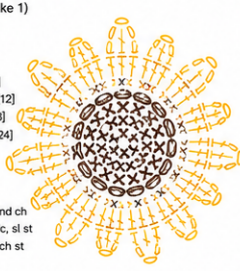


Back (Plain sc)

2. SUNFLOWER (Make 1)

Center (Brown)
Magic ring.
Round 1: 6 sc in ring. [6]
Round 2: inc in each st. [12]
Round 3: (sc, inc) x 6. [18]
Round 4: (2 sc, inc) x 6. [24]
Fasten off.

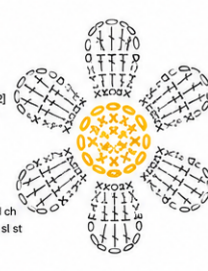
Petals (Yellow)
Join yellow.
Round 1: (ch 7, sl st in 2nd ch from hook, hdc, dc, tr, dc, sl st in same st as join) in each st around. [12 petals]
Fasten off.



3. DAISY (Make 1)

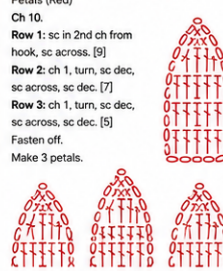
Center (Yellow)
Magic ring.
Round 1: 6 sc in ring. [6]
Round 2: inc in each st. [12]
Round 3: (sc, inc) x 6. [18]
Fasten off.

Petals (White)
Join white.
Round 1: (ch 7, sl st in 2nd ch from hook, hdc, dc, tr, dc, sl st in same st) in each st around. [12 petals]
Fasten off.



4. TULIP (Make 1)

Petals (Red)
Ch 10.
Row 1: sc in 2nd ch from hook, sc across. [9]
Row 2: ch 1, turn, sc dec, sc across, sc dec. [7]
Row 3: ch 1, turn, sc dec, sc across, sc dec. [5]
Fasten off.
Make 3 petals.

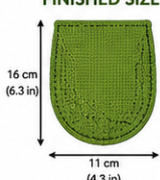


5. ASSEMBLY

1. Sew or glue the flower (sunflower, daisy or tulip) to the front of the pocket, above the leaves.
2. Hide all yarn tails.
3. Your cutlery pocket is ready to use!

- Use cotton yarn for a sturdy and washable finish.
- Block your pieces if needed for a neater shape.

Crochet Flower Cutlery Pocket Tutorial

Sunflower, Daisy, and Tulip Designs

These handmade Crochet Flower Cutlery Pockets are decorative utensil holders

designed to look like small green leaves with bright flowers growing from the top. They are perfect for spring dinners, garden parties, Easter tables, Mother's Day celebrations, weddings, picnics, or everyday kitchen décor.

This tutorial includes instructions for three flower styles:

- Sunflower
- Daisy
- Tulip

Each finished pocket measures approximately 4.75 inches tall by 4.25 inches wide. The flower adds approximately 2.5 to 2.75 inches to the total height.

The pattern uses standard US crochet terminology.

Materials

**To make one complete cutlery pocket,
gather the following supplies:**

- **Worsted weight number 4 cotton yarn**
- **Green yarn for the pocket and leaves**
- **Yellow yarn for the sunflower petals
or daisy center**
- **Brown yarn for the sunflower center**
- **White yarn for the daisy petals**
- **Red yarn for the tulip petals**
- **4.0 mm crochet hook, approximately
US size G/6**
- **Yarn needle**
- **Scissors**
- **Stitch markers, optional**
- **Rust-resistant sewing pins, optional**
- **Measuring tape**
- **Fork, knife, and spoon for checking
the finished size**

**Cotton yarn is recommended because it
creates a firm fabric, holds its shape
well, and can be washed easily. Acrylic**

yarn may also be used, but the finished pocket may feel softer and stretch more.

Crochet Abbreviations

The following abbreviations are used throughout the tutorial:

- **ch – chain**
- **sl st – slip stitch**
- **sc – single crochet**
- **dc – double crochet**
- **hdc – half double crochet**
- **tr – treble crochet**
- **inc – increase by working two stitches into the same stitch**
- **dec – decrease**
- **sc2tog – single crochet two stitches together**
- **st or sts – stitch or stitches**
- **yo – yarn over**
- **rep – repeat**
- **RS – right side**
- **WS – wrong side**

- * – repeat the instructions between the asterisks

Keep your tension firm but comfortable. The pocket should be dense enough to support the cutlery without stretching too much.

Step 1: Crochet the Main Pocket Rectangle

The green pocket is made as a flat rectangle and then folded in half.

Make two identical green rectangles for each pocket.

Begin with green yarn.

Foundation chain:

Chain 15.

Row 1:

Work 1 single crochet in the second chain from the hook. Work 1 single crochet in each remaining chain across.

You should have 14 single crochet stitches.

Chain 1 and turn.

Rows 2 through 12:

Work 1 single crochet in each stitch across.

You should continue to have 14 stitches in every row.

Chain 1 and turn at the end of each row, except after the final row.

Fasten off and leave a long yarn tail for sewing.

The finished rectangle should be approximately twice the desired height of the folded pocket. Slight differences are acceptable because yarn thickness and personal tension may vary.

Make a second rectangle in the same way.

For a firmer pocket, you may add one or two additional rows. Before fastening off, fold the rectangle in half and place a fork inside to check the size. The utensil handles should fit comfortably without the pocket feeling loose.

Step 2: Fold and Sew the Pocket

Place one rectangle on a flat surface with the right side facing down.

Fold the rectangle in half so that the short edges meet. The folded piece should now resemble a small pouch.

Thread the long green yarn tail through a yarn needle.

Beginning at one upper corner, sew down the first side using whip stitch or mattress stitch. Secure the yarn at the lower corner.

Repeat along the opposite side.

Leave the top edge completely open.

Turn the pocket right side out and gently shape the corners with your fingers.

Repeat the same process with the second rectangle if you are preparing an additional pocket or reinforcing the design.

The basic pocket should now measure approximately:

- **4.75 inches tall**
- **4.25 inches wide**

The measurements do not need to be exact, but the pocket should be large enough to hold a standard dinner fork, spoon, and knife.

Step 3: Crochet the Decorative Leaves

Each pocket has two long green leaves attached diagonally across the front.

Make two leaves for each cutlery pocket.

Begin with green yarn.

Foundation chain:

Chain 10.

Row 1:

Work 1 single crochet in the second chain from the hook.

Work 1 single crochet in the next stitch.

Work 1 half double crochet in the next stitch.

Work 1 single crochet in each of the next 7 stitches.

Work 1 half double crochet in the final stitch.

The stitches should naturally create a narrow leaf shape.

Row 2:

Turn the work and crochet along the opposite side of the foundation chain.

Work the following sequence evenly around the second side:

- 1 slip stitch
- 1 single crochet
- 1 half double crochet
- 1 double crochet
- 1 half double crochet
- 1 single crochet
- 1 slip stitch

Adjust the placement slightly when necessary so the stitches are evenly distributed.

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for sewing.

Gently stretch and shape the leaf so that one end forms a pointed tip and the other forms a narrow stem.

Make the second leaf in the same manner.

For a more defined center vein, surface crochet a line of slip stitches from the base to the tip of each leaf. Another option is to embroider a straight line with green yarn using a yarn needle.

Step 4: Attach the Leaves to the Pocket

Lay the pocket flat with the opening at the top.

Position the first leaf diagonally across the front. The pointed tip should angle upward toward the center of the pocket.

Place the second leaf on the opposite side, creating a symmetrical V-shaped arrangement.

The lower ends of the leaves should meet near the lower center of the pocket.

Pin the leaves in position.

Using the long yarn tails and a yarn needle, sew around the outside edge of each leaf. Use small, even stitches so the sewing thread blends into the crochet fabric.

Do not pull the stitches too tightly because this may cause the pocket to pucker.

Secure the yarn ends on the inside of the pocket.

Check that the leaves are firmly attached while still retaining their raised, textured appearance.

Step 5: Crochet the Sunflower Center

Use brown yarn.

Round 1:

Chain 4 and join with a slip stitch in the first chain to form a ring.

Work 6 single crochet stitches into the center of the ring.

Join with a slip stitch in the first single crochet.

You should have 6 stitches.

Round 2:

Work 2 single crochet stitches into each stitch around.

Join with a slip stitch.

You should have 12 stitches.

Round 3:

Repeat the following around:

Work 2 single crochet stitches in the next stitch, then 1 single crochet in the following stitch.

Join with a slip stitch.

You should have 18 stitches.

Round 4:

Repeat the following around:

Work 2 single crochet stitches in the next stitch, then 1 single crochet in each of the next 2 stitches.

Join with a slip stitch.

You should have 24 stitches.

Fasten off and weave in the brown yarn end.

The center should be a flat brown circle.

To create additional texture, you may embroider small curved stitches or French knots over the center using a darker brown yarn.

Step 6: Crochet the Sunflower Petals

Join yellow yarn to any stitch from Round 4 of the brown center.

Work the following petal sequence into the same stitch or space:

Chain 1, double crochet, treble crochet, double crochet, chain 1, slip stitch in the next stitch.

Repeat this sequence evenly around the brown center.

Aim to create approximately 12 petals.

The exact number may vary slightly depending on stitch placement. The important goal is to keep the petals evenly distributed.

After completing the final petal, join with a slip stitch.

Fasten off and weave in the yellow yarn ends.

Shape each petal gently with your fingers. The sunflower should have a brown circular center surrounded by long yellow petals.

Step 7: Crochet the Daisy Center

Use yellow yarn.

Round 1:

Chain 4 and join with a slip stitch to form a ring.

Work 6 single crochet stitches into the ring.

Join with a slip stitch.

You should have 6 stitches.

Round 2:

Work 2 single crochet stitches into each stitch around.

Join with a slip stitch.

You should have 12 stitches.

Round 3:

Repeat the following around:

Work 2 single crochet stitches in the next stitch, then 1 single crochet in the following stitch.

Join with a slip stitch.

You should have 18 stitches.

Fasten off.

The finished daisy center should be smaller than the sunflower center.

Step 8: Crochet the Daisy Petals

Join white yarn to any stitch from the outer round of the yellow center.

Work the following sequence:

Chain 1, double crochet, treble crochet, double crochet, chain 1, slip stitch into the next stitch.

Repeat the sequence around the center to create approximately 12 white petals.

Join with a slip stitch after the final petal.

Fasten off and weave in the yarn ends.

Spread the petals evenly around the yellow center.

For longer daisy petals, replace the treble crochet with a double treble crochet. However, keep all petals the same length for a balanced flower.

Step 9: Crochet the Tulip Petals

The tulip is made from three separate red petals.

Make three identical petals.

Begin with red yarn.

Foundation chain:

Chain 10.

Row 1:

Work 1 single crochet in the second chain from the hook.

Work 1 single crochet in the next stitch.

Work 1 half double crochet in the next stitch.

Work 1 half double crochet in each remaining stitch.

Turn.

Row 2:

Work the following stitches evenly across and around the opposite side of the foundation chain:

- **1 slip stitch**
- **1 single crochet**
- **1 half double crochet**
- **1 double crochet**
- **1 half double crochet**

- **1 single crochet**
- **1 slip stitch**

Fasten off, leaving a long tail for assembly.

Shape the top of the petal into a soft point.

Repeat until you have three red petals.

To make a fuller tulip, you may make two additional smaller petals and place them behind the original three. The chart, however, uses three main petals.

Step 10: Assemble the Tulip Flower

Place the three red petals on a flat surface.

Position the center petal first.

Place the second petal slightly behind the left side of the center petal.

Place the third petal slightly behind the right side.

The lower edges should overlap, while the pointed tops remain visible.

Thread one of the red yarn tails onto a yarn needle.

Sew through all three layers near the lower edges. Add several secure stitches without flattening the petals completely.

Fasten off and weave in the remaining red yarn ends.

The completed flower should resemble a closed tulip bud with three overlapping pointed petals.

For the green tulip base, crochet or reuse two small green leaves and position them around the lower part of the flower.

Step 11: Attach the Sunflower to the Pocket

Place the sunflower behind the upper edge of the green pocket.

The brown center should remain fully visible above the opening, while the lower section of the flower sits slightly behind the pocket.

The flower should appear to be growing out of the leaf-shaped holder.

Pin it temporarily in place.

Using yellow or brown yarn and a yarn needle, sew the lower portion of the flower securely to the back edge of the pocket.

Avoid sewing across the pocket opening.

Check that the cutlery can still slide inside easily.

Secure the yarn ends inside the pocket.

Step 12: Attach the Daisy to the Pocket

Position the daisy behind the upper edge of the pocket.

Center the yellow circle above the opening and spread the white petals evenly.

The bottom petals may overlap the green pocket slightly, while the upper petals remain visible.

Pin the flower in place.

Use white or yellow yarn to sew the lower section of the flower to the back of the pocket.

Make several secure stitches through the flower center and the upper edge of the pocket.

Do not sew through both layers of the pouch, or the opening may become blocked.

Fasten off and hide the yarn ends inside.

Step 13: Attach the Tulip to the Pocket

Place the assembled red tulip behind the upper edge of the green pocket.

Position the tallest petal in the center.

Arrange the two outer petals at slight angles.

The flower should sit low enough to remain stable but high enough for the red petals to be clearly visible.

Place two green leaves around the base of the tulip, allowing them to overlap the red petals slightly.

Pin all the components in place.

Using matching yarn, sew the lower red edges and the green leaves to the back of the pocket.

Check the front frequently while sewing to maintain a neat, symmetrical shape.

Fasten off securely.

Step 14: Weave in All Yarn Ends

Turn the pocket over and inspect the back and inside.

Thread each loose yarn end through a yarn needle.

Weave the yarn through several nearby stitches in one direction, then reverse direction and weave through several more stitches.

Trim the remaining yarn close to the fabric.

Do not cut the yarn immediately beside a knot because the piece may loosen during washing.

Check all attached leaves and flowers by gently pulling them. Reinforce any section that feels loose.

Step 15: Block and Shape the Finished Pocket

Blocking helps the pocket and flower hold a clean, professional shape.

Fill a small bowl with cool water.

Lightly dampen the crochet piece. Do not soak it excessively.

Press the water out gently using a clean towel. Do not twist or wring the crochet.

Place the pocket on a dry towel or foam blocking mat.

Shape the green pocket into an even pouch.

Straighten the decorative leaves.

Arrange the flower petals individually.

Allow the project to dry completely while lying flat.

Cotton yarn may become slightly softer after blocking, but it should retain enough structure to support the cutlery.

Step 16: Insert the Cutlery

Place a fork, knife, and spoon together with the handles aligned.

Slide the handles into the pocket opening.

The utensil heads should remain above the flower and pocket.

Arrange the cutlery so the weight is distributed evenly.

For a formal table, place the knife in the center and position the fork and spoon on either side.

The finished pocket may be placed directly on a dinner plate, beside the plate, or on top of a folded cloth napkin.

Tips for the Best Results

Use 100 percent cotton yarn for the most durable and washable result.

Keep your single crochet stitches tight enough to create a firm fabric.

Use a smaller hook when your stitches are too loose. A 3.5 mm hook can make

the pocket firmer, while a 4.5 mm hook can make it slightly larger.

Match your sewing yarn to the section being attached. Use green for the leaves, yellow for the sunflower or daisy, and red for the tulip.

When making several pockets for a table setting, count the rows and stitches carefully so every piece is the same size.

Use locking stitch markers to mark the first stitch of each flower round.

Avoid overfilling the pocket. Three standard utensils are recommended.

These pockets can also hold:

- **Wooden picnic utensils**
- **Small craft tools**
- **Crochet hooks**
- **Pencils**
- **Gift cards**
- **Rolled napkins**

- **Small party favors**

Care Instructions

Hand wash the finished pocket in cool water using a mild detergent.

Do not use bleach.

Press out excess water gently with a towel.

Reshape the pocket, leaves, and petals while damp.

Lay the piece flat to dry.

Do not place it in a tumble dryer unless the yarn label specifically allows machine drying.

Do not iron directly over the textured petals. When light pressing is necessary, place a cotton cloth between the iron and the crochet and use the lowest suitable temperature.

Store the pockets flat to prevent the flowers from becoming crushed.

Final Project Checklist

Before using your finished Crochet Flower Cutlery Pocket, confirm that:

- **The pocket is securely sewn on both sides.**
- **The top opening remains unobstructed.**
- **Both decorative leaves are firmly attached.**
- **The flower is centered and stable.**
- **All yarn ends are woven in.**
- **The piece has been blocked and fully dried.**
- **The cutlery fits comfortably inside.**
- **The flower petals are shaped evenly.**

Your handmade Sunflower, Daisy, or Tulip Crochet Cutlery Pocket is now complete. 🌻 🌼 🌷

Make one design for each place setting or combine all three flowers to create a cheerful garden-inspired table arrangement.
