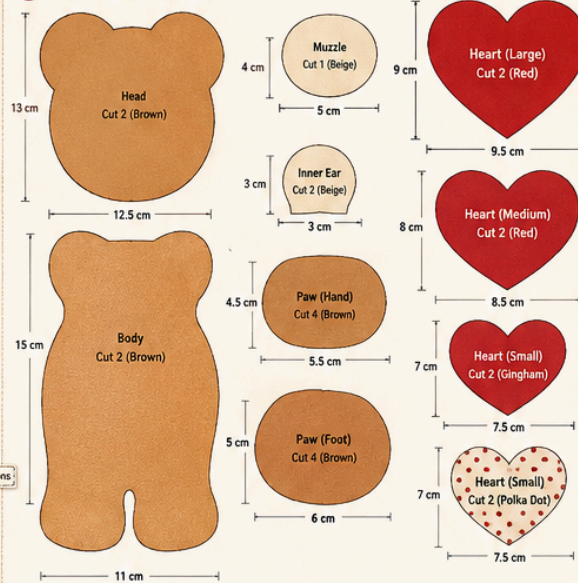


FELT TEDDY BEAR WITH HEARTS – WALL HANGING TUTORIAL

A step-by-step sewing guide with complete pattern and measurements (in cm)



1 PATTERN PIECES (Actual Size)



2 ASSEMBLE THE FACE



FINISHED SIZE

Height: 32 cm
Width: 21 cm

MATERIALS

- Felt (2 mm thick):
 - Brown (light): 30 x 30 cm
 - Beige (cream): 10 x 10 cm
 - Red: 20 x 20 cm
 - Red gingham fabric: 10 x 10 cm
 - Cream fabric with red dots: 10 x 10 cm
 - Lace trim: 30 cm
- Buttons (small): 4
- Black beads (6 mm): 2 (eyes)
- Brown felt (dark): small piece (nose)
- Stuffing (polyfill)
- Thick embroidery thread (matching brown, red, beige, white)
- Hanging rope (30 cm)
- Wooden bead (1 cm): 1
- Hot glue (optional)
- Sewing needle
- Scissors
- Felt marker or pencil

3 MAKE THE HEARTS



- For each heart, sew the front and back pieces together with blanket or whip stitch, leaving the top slightly open.
- Insert a small amount of stuffing.
- Close the opening with stitches.
- Decorate as shown:
 - Add lace across the middle.
 - Sew a button in the center.

4 PREPARE THE BODY



- Sew the front and back body pieces together with blanket or whip stitch.
- Before closing completely, stuff the body firmly.
- Close the bottom opening.

5 ATTACH THE HEAD



- Position the head on top of the body.
- Sew around the neck area firmly to attach.

6 ATTACH ARMS AND LEGS



- Sew the arms (paws) to the front of the body.
- Sew the legs (feet) to the bottom front of the body.

7 ADD THE HEARTS



- Arrange the hearts as in the photo.
- Hand stitch them to the bear's arms and body securely.

8 ADD THE SCARF



- Cut a strip of gingham fabric (3.5 x 20 cm).
- Tie around the bear's neck.
- Fray or cut small fringes on the ends if desired.

9 HANGING LOOP



- Thread the rope through the top behind the head.
- Tie a knot and add the wooden bead at the top.
- Secure with a drop of glue if needed.

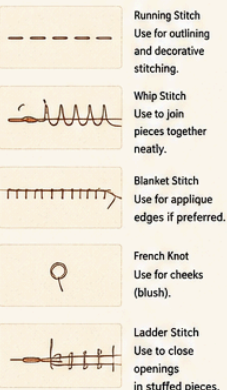
10 FINAL LOOK



Your felt teddy bear with hearts wall hanging is ready!

Perfect for Valentine's Day, Christmas, or home décor.

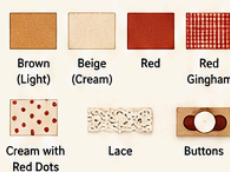
MAIN SEWING METHODS



TIPS

- Use thick felt (2 mm) for durability.
- Blanket stitch gives a decorative handmade look.
- You can use hot glue to help hold small pieces before stitching.
- Adjust heart colors and fabrics to match your decor.
- Make it smaller by reducing all pattern pieces by 75%.

COLOR GUIDE (Suggestion)



CARE INSTRUCTIONS

- For decoration only.
- Keep away from moisture.
- Spot clean gently with a dry cloth.
- Store in a dry place.



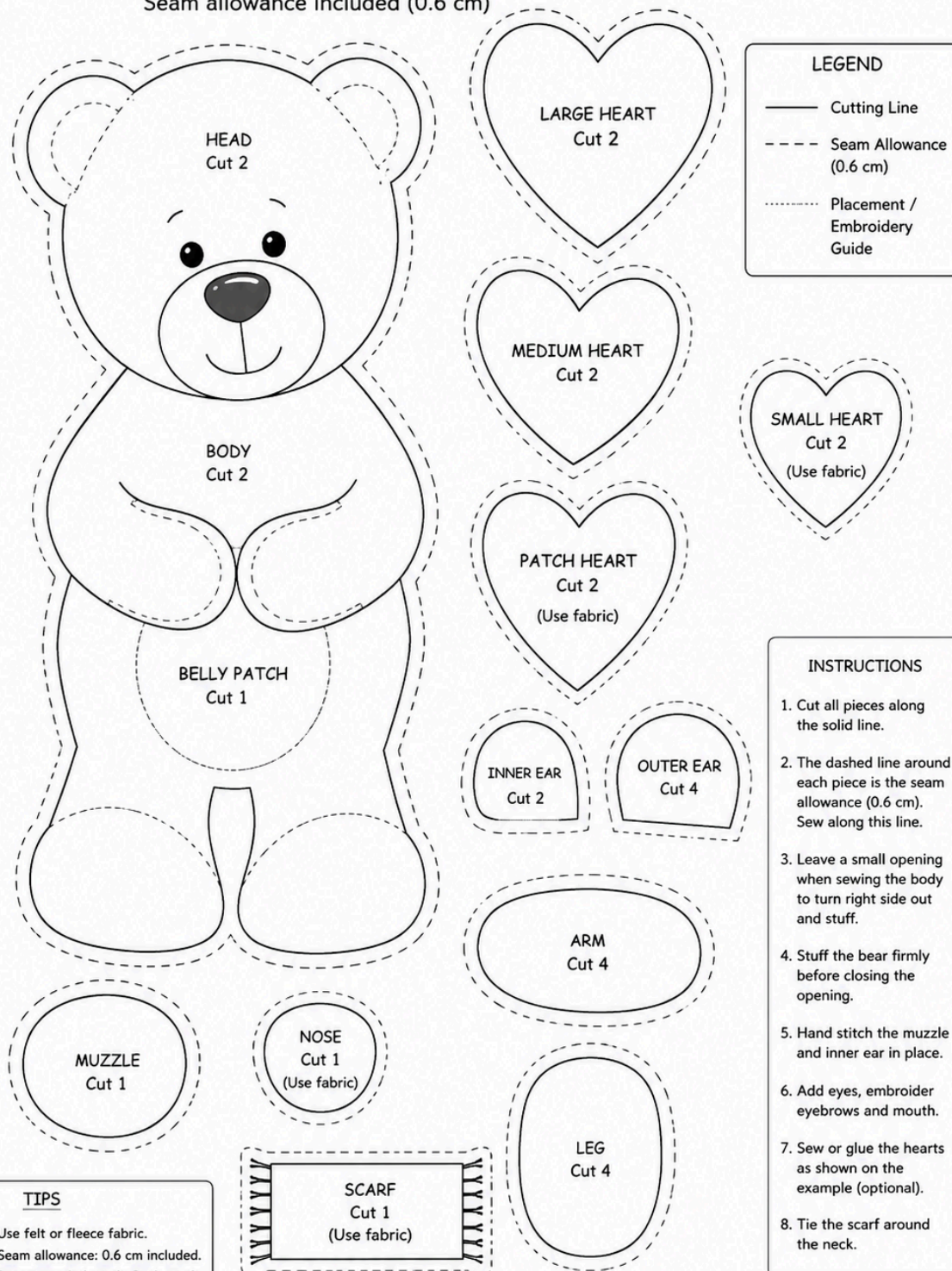

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Felt Teddy Bear with Hearts – Wall Hanging Tutorial

This Felt Teddy Bear with Hearts Wall Hanging is a charming handmade sewing project designed as a decorative hanging for a bedroom, craft room, nursery, holiday display, or handmade gift. The finished teddy bear measures approximately 32 cm (12.6 in) tall by 21 cm (8.3 in) wide.

The project is made primarily from 2 mm thick felt, with a soft brown teddy bear holding several padded hearts in red, gingham, polka dots, and lace. The construction uses beginner-friendly hand-sewing techniques such as running stitch, whip stitch, blanket stitch, French knots, and ladder stitch.

The instructions below follow the measurements, materials, construction order, and decorative style shown in the tutorial graphic so the finished piece remains consistent with the original design.

Step 1 – Gather the Materials

Prepare all your materials before cutting. Having everything organized makes assembly considerably easier.

You will need:

- 2 mm felt
- Brown felt, approximately 30 × 30 cm
- Beige or cream felt, approximately 10 × 10 cm
- Red felt, approximately 20 × 20 cm
- Red gingham fabric, approximately 10 × 10 cm
- Cream fabric with red dots, approximately 10 × 10 cm

- Decorative lace trim, approximately 30 cm
- Small buttons
- Black beads, approximately 6 mm, for the eyes
- Dark brown felt for the nose
- Polyester fiberfill
- Thick embroidery thread in brown, red, beige, and white
- Approximately 30 cm of hanging rope or cord
- One small wooden bead, approximately 1 cm
- Hot glue, optional
- Hand-sewing needle
- Fabric scissors
- Felt marker, chalk pencil, or fabric pencil

For the cleanest appearance, select embroidery thread that coordinates closely with each felt color.

Step 2 – Prepare the Teddy Bear Pattern Pieces

The teddy bear is constructed from separate head, body, muzzle, ear, paw, foot, and heart pieces.

Trace the pattern shapes onto paper first, then transfer them to the corresponding felt or fabric.

Teddy Bear Head

Cut 2 pieces from brown felt.

Approximate finished pattern dimensions:

Height: 13 cm

Width: 12.5 cm

The head should have a rounded lower section with two rounded ear shapes incorporated into the upper silhouette.

Teddy Bear Body

Cut 2 pieces from brown felt.

Approximate dimensions:

Height: 15 cm

Width: approximately 11 cm at the bottom

The body has a slightly narrower neck area, rounded shoulders, and two rounded lower leg sections.

Muzzle

Cut 1 piece from beige felt.

Approximate dimensions:

Width: 5 cm

Height: 4 cm

The muzzle should be oval with a softly flattened lower edge.

Inner Ears

Cut 2 pieces from beige felt.

Approximate size:

3 × 3 cm

Each inner ear should be a rounded semicircular shape.

Hand Paws

Cut 4 pieces from brown felt.

Approximate dimensions:

Width: 5.5 cm

Height: 4.5 cm

These pieces form the teddy bear's two padded arms or hands.

Foot Paws

Cut 4 pieces from brown felt.

Approximate dimensions:

Width: 6 cm

Height: 5 cm

The foot pieces are slightly larger and rounder than the hand paws.

Step 3 – Cut the Heart Pieces

The teddy bear holds several padded decorative hearts.

Each completed heart requires two matching fabric or felt pieces.

Large Red Heart

Cut 2 pieces from red felt.

Approximate dimensions:

Width: 9.5 cm

Height: 9 cm

Medium Red Heart

Cut 2 pieces from red felt.

Approximate dimensions:

Width: 8.5 cm

Height: 8 cm

Small Red Gingham Heart

Cut 2 pieces from red gingham fabric.

Approximate dimensions:

Width: 7.5 cm

Height: 7 cm

Small Polka-Dot Heart

Cut 2 pieces from cream fabric with red dots.

Approximate dimensions:

Width: 7.5 cm

Height: 7 cm

If you want the finished wall hanging to closely match the reference project, keep the hearts within this red, cream, and gingham color palette.

Step 4 – Assemble the Teddy Bear Face

Begin with one brown felt head piece. This will become the front of the teddy bear's face.

Place the beige muzzle approximately in the lower center of the face.

Pin or temporarily secure it in position.

Sew around the outside edge of the muzzle using a whip stitch or small blanket stitch.

Keep the stitches evenly spaced.

Cut a small rounded triangular nose from dark brown felt.

Position the nose near the upper center of the muzzle and stitch it securely in place.

Using dark brown embroidery thread, create a vertical line extending downward from the nose.

From the bottom of that line, embroider two gentle curves to form the teddy bear's smiling mouth.

Step 5 – Add the Eyes and Cheeks

Position two 6 mm black beads above the muzzle.

Before sewing them permanently, check that they are symmetrical.

Attach each bead securely with strong thread.

For a softer expression, place the eyes relatively close to the muzzle rather than too high on the forehead.

To create the rosy cheeks shown in the tutorial, add subtle blush to both sides of the muzzle area.

A fabric-safe blush, pastel, textile pigment, or very lightly applied craft coloring may be used.

For additional detail, small French knots can be added near the cheeks.

The result should be a friendly, handmade facial expression rather than a perfectly symmetrical manufactured appearance.

Step 6 – Attach the Inner Ears

Place one beige inner-ear piece over each brown ear section.

Align each beige piece so that a narrow brown border remains visible around it.

Sew the inner ears in place with small whip stitches or blanket stitches.

Use beige or coordinating embroidery thread.

Keep the stitches decorative but neat because they will remain visible on the finished teddy bear.

Step 7 – Sew and Stuff the Teddy Bear Head

Place the completed front head piece over the second brown head piece.

Make sure the wrong sides are facing inward and the edges match.

Sew around the perimeter using blanket stitch or whip stitch.

Leave an opening large enough for stuffing.

Insert small amounts of polyester fiberfill gradually.

Pay special attention to the ears and sides of the face so the stuffing is distributed evenly.

Do not overstuff the head.

The finished piece should feel softly padded while still maintaining the flat handmade appearance of a felt wall decoration.

Once satisfied with the shape, close the remaining opening securely.

A ladder stitch can be used if you prefer a less visible closure.

Step 8 – Assemble the Teddy Bear Body

Place the two brown body pieces together.

Align all edges carefully.

Starting near one side, sew around the body using blanket stitch or whip stitch.

Leave an opening along the lower portion.

Gradually insert polyester fiberfill through the opening.

Fill the shoulder area first, followed by the center and lower body.

Distribute the stuffing evenly with your fingers.

Avoid packing the body too firmly because the finished teddy bear should remain lightweight enough to hang comfortably on a wall.

Once stuffed, close the opening with matching embroidery thread.

Step 9 – Attach the Head to the Body

Position the finished head over the top of the stuffed body.

Allow the lower part of the head to overlap the upper body slightly.

Check the teddy bear from the front before sewing.

The face should remain centered above the body.

Pin the head temporarily if necessary.

Using strong brown embroidery thread, sew through both layers around the neck area.

Make several reinforcing stitches because the head must support the hanging cord and decorative hearts.

Keep the attachment stitches as discreet as possible.

Step 10 – Sew the Teddy Bear Arms

Each arm or hand paw requires two matching brown felt pieces.

Place two pieces together and sew around the outer perimeter.

Leave a small opening.

Add a modest amount of polyester fiberfill.

The paws should be padded but not extremely thick.

Close the opening securely.

Repeat the procedure for the second arm.

Position the two finished paws on the front sides of the teddy bear's body.

Angle them slightly inward so they appear to be holding the hearts.

Hand-sew the upper sections of the paws firmly to the body.

Leave part of each paw free so the decorative hearts can slide underneath or overlap naturally.

Step 11 – Sew and Attach the Feet

Place two matching brown foot pieces together.

Sew around the perimeter, leaving a small stuffing opening.

Insert polyester fiberfill.

Shape the foot gently while stuffing.

Close the opening.

Repeat for the second foot.

Position the feet near the bottom front of the body.

The rounded ends should extend slightly outward.

Hand-sew them firmly to the body.

The two feet should remain relatively symmetrical while retaining the charming handmade look of the original project.

Step 12 – Make the Stuffed Hearts

Take one pair of matching heart pieces.

Place the pieces together with the decorative sides facing outward.

For felt hearts, sew around the perimeter using blanket stitch.

For gingham or cotton hearts, a small whip stitch or running stitch can also be used.

Leave a small opening near one side.

Insert a small amount of polyester fiberfill.

Push the filling carefully into the upper curves and pointed lower section of the heart.

Do not overstuff.

The hearts should remain fairly flat.

Close the opening securely.

Repeat this procedure for every heart.

Step 13 – Decorate the Hearts

The heart decorations are one of the main visual features of this project.

Add a strip of cream lace horizontally across one or more hearts.

Hand-stitch the lace securely along the edges.

You may also layer a smaller gingham section near the bottom of a red heart, as shown in the tutorial.

Place a decorative button near the center or upper portion of selected hearts.

Sew the buttons rather than relying entirely on glue whenever possible.

Combining red felt, red gingham, cream polka dots, lace, and wooden-style buttons creates the country-inspired appearance shown in the original wall hanging.

Step 14 – Arrange the Hearts on the Teddy Bear

Lay the teddy bear flat on your work surface.

Arrange the stuffed hearts between the bear's arms.

Start with the larger heart toward the upper section.

Place the medium and smaller hearts below it, overlapping them slightly.

Alternate fabrics so neighboring hearts do not look identical.

For example, place a red felt heart next to a cream polka-dot heart and then overlap it with a gingham heart.

Continue adjusting the arrangement until the group looks balanced.

The teddy bear's paws should visually wrap around the heart cluster.

Once satisfied, temporarily pin the hearts in place.

Step 15 – Hand-Sew the Hearts in Position

Using matching embroidery thread, hand-sew the hearts securely to the body.

Do not stitch around the complete perimeter of every heart.

Instead, use several hidden attachment points along the back edges.

This preserves the dimensional appearance.

Attach the hearts to each other where they overlap.

Then secure the outer hearts underneath or beside the teddy bear's paws.

Check that nothing shifts when the wall hanging is lifted.

Because the hanging decoration may be handled periodically, reinforcing stitches are recommended.

Step 16 – Make the Gingham Scarf 🎀

Cut a strip of red gingham fabric approximately:

3.5 × 20 cm

Wrap the strip around the teddy bear's neck.

Tie it in a simple knot or arrange it like a short scarf.

Allow both ends to hang toward one side.

Trim the ends if necessary.

For a rustic appearance, gently pull a few threads from the fabric ends to create a lightly frayed edge.

Do not fray excessively.

The scarf should remain recognizable and sturdy.

If desired, secure the knot with one or two hidden stitches.

Step 17 – Create the Hanging Loop

Cut approximately 30 cm of cord or rope.

Thread the cord through or behind the upper portion of the teddy bear's head.

Position the ends so the hanging loop is centered.

Tie the cord securely.

At the top center, add the 1 cm wooden bead shown in the tutorial.

Depending on the cord and bead opening, the bead may be threaded directly onto the cord before tying.

Secure the attachment with several strong stitches through the back of the head.

A very small amount of hot glue may be added as reinforcement if necessary.

The stitching, however, should provide the primary structural support.

Before finishing, lift the teddy bear by the hanging loop and check its balance.

If it tilts noticeably, reposition the cord slightly.

Step 18 – Recommended Sewing Methods

Several basic sewing techniques are used throughout the project.

Running Stitch

Running stitch consists of small stitches moving in and out of the fabric in a straight line.

Use it for decorative stitching, lightweight seams, or attaching trim.

Keep each stitch approximately the same length for a polished handmade appearance.

Whip Stitch

Whip stitch wraps repeatedly around the edges of two fabric pieces.

It is excellent for assembling felt because it holds the layers together securely while remaining easy for beginners.

Use small, evenly spaced stitches.

Blanket Stitch

Blanket stitch is one of the most attractive methods for finishing felt edges.

It creates a decorative line of looped stitches around the perimeter.

Use it around the teddy bear's body, head, paws, or hearts when you want the stitching to become part of the design.

French Knot

French knots create tiny raised dots.

They may be used around the teddy bear's cheeks or as small decorative accents.

Wrap the embroidery thread around the needle, insert the needle close to the original point, and pull the thread through slowly.

Ladder Stitch

Ladder stitch is especially useful for closing stuffing openings.

Alternating stitches are made along the folded edges of both sides.

When the thread is gently pulled, the seam closes with very little visible stitching.

Step 19 – Final Shaping and Inspection

Place the completed teddy bear flat on a table.

Check the head, body, paws, feet, scarf, hearts, and hanging loop.

Gently redistribute stuffing if any areas appear uneven.

Trim loose thread ends.

Check every button and bead.

Make sure the eyes cannot be pulled loose.

Confirm that all hearts are firmly attached.

Straighten the lace and adjust the scarf.

Lift the teddy bear by the hanging loop and make sure it hangs vertically.

The approximate finished dimensions should be:

Height: 32 cm / approximately 12.6 inches

Width: 21 cm / approximately 8.3 inches

Because this is a handmade felt project, minor size differences are completely normal.

Step 20 – Color Guide

For a result similar to the tutorial, use the following palette:

Bear: light or medium warm brown

Muzzle: cream or beige

Inner ears: cream or beige

Large hearts: deep red

Accent hearts: red gingham

Additional hearts: cream with small red dots

Decorative trim: cream lace

Eyes: black

Nose: dark brown

Scarf: red gingham

Buttons: natural wood, tan, cream, or coordinating red tones

These colors create a warm farmhouse, Christmas, Valentine's Day, or country-craft appearance.

Step 21 – Helpful Construction Tips

Use 2 mm felt whenever possible because it provides enough structure for the wall hanging without making the finished piece excessively heavy.

Blanket stitch works especially well because it strengthens raw felt edges while also creating an attractive handmade finish.

Use small amounts of stuffing at a time. Adding too much stuffing can distort the shape of the head, body, paws, or hearts.

When positioning decorative pieces, always arrange everything before permanently stitching it.

Small dabs of fabric-safe glue or hot glue can temporarily hold lace, buttons, or layered decorations in position, but structural pieces should still be sewn.

If you would like to create a smaller teddy bear, the tutorial graphic suggests reducing all pattern pieces to approximately 75% of their original size.

Be sure to reduce every piece by the same percentage so the proportions remain correct.

Step 22 – Care Instructions

This felt teddy bear is intended primarily as a decorative item.

Avoid soaking or machine washing it.

Keep it away from excessive moisture.

If dust accumulates, gently clean the surface with a dry or very slightly damp cloth.

Small marks can be spot-cleaned carefully.

Avoid rubbing the felt aggressively because this may cause pilling or distortion.

Store the wall hanging in a dry location when it is not being displayed.

Avoid crushing it underneath heavy objects.

Finished Project

Your Felt Teddy Bear with Hearts Wall Hanging is now complete.

The finished teddy features a softly stuffed brown body, cream muzzle and ears, embroidered facial details, padded paws and feet, a red gingham scarf, and a layered collection of handmade hearts decorated with gingham fabric, polka dots, lace, and buttons.

The hanging loop allows the project to be displayed on a wall, door, cabinet knob, craft-room hook, or decorative peg.

Its combination of warm brown felt and red hearts makes it especially suitable for Valentine's Day, Christmas, farmhouse décor, nursery decoration, or handmade gift giving.

For the most consistent result, keep your blanket stitches evenly spaced, use light stuffing, and arrange all the hearts before securing them permanently.

A useful next step would be to create a full-size printable English pattern sheet with seam allowance for every teddy bear and heart piece, matching these measurements.

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
